Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida

Minutes of

One Hundred, Fifty-Eighth 2005 Annual Grand Convocation

May 4, 2004

At 8:00 am on Saturday May 7, 2005, the 158th Grand Convocation of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida was opened in full form by Jacksonville Chapter No. 12. M. E. Glenn Edwin Chandler, Grand High Priest and the Grand Officers were introduced and given proper honors. After assuming their proper stations the M. I. Grand Master, Donald T. Harriott, and R. E. Grand Commander, William G. Ellis, were introduced and given proper honors and were invited to sit in the East. The M. E. Past Grand High Priests were introduced and given Grand Honors. The Distinguished Guests were then introduced by M. Ex. Companion Duane B. Young and given proper honors.

The roll call was then taken (list to follow minutes). The Grand Secretary made the motion that all visiting Dignitaries be given Honorary Memberships; it was seconded and passed. The Grand Secretary, Virgil P. Brown, then made a motion that the minutes as printed and distributed in the proceedings be accepted as written; it was seconded and approved. The Grand Secretary then made the motion that the committee reports be accepted as printed and distributed. Companion Frank Clawson gave the preliminary Returns and Credentials report, and reported that there were a couple of chapters delegates not signed in yet. The Grand Secretary, Companion Brown then commented that Thursday when he was blind sided by the budget, he didn't have a lot of time to think about the budget, they took away Chris's expense account which means she will not be able to afford attending the District meetings and run the office errands, also his expense account was removed making him wonder if he is still expected to attend all the district meetings. The FICA tax is too low if the Grand Secretary and Grand Treasurer are to be considered on salary. Also the copier that is to be removed from the office cannot be satisfactorily replaced with the small desk top copier that was suggested as it is much to small for our work load, such as printing the rituals, proceedings, and the many reports that are stapled for the convention. Also there is no money for overtime for Chris since the smaller copier will take more time. He is so concerned about the budget that he is considering resigning as Grand Recorder from the Grand Council and Grand Commandery, but he will see what the Grand Chapter does today.

M. E. Companion, Glenn Chandler, Grand High Priest, then gave his report, which was accepted as read. Ex. Companion Virgil Brown commented on his comments on companions reading from their rituals and suggested that the rituals be enlarged to full size sheets of paper so that they cannot be hand held during ritualistic work.

R. Ex. Companion William Wyllie gave the budget committee report stating that changes had been made to the original budget to match the changes made by Grand Council and Grand Commandery budgets. Copies of the budget were passed among the companions as it was being read. Companion H. Warren Almand, PGHP stated that he did not like the fact that the budget was not available before the Grand Convocation and that this should not be allowed to happen again. Companion Harvey L. Ward, Sr. commented that he was distressed with what happened in the Grand Council and that we haven't been able to see a copy and that the Grand Secretary has been distressed with what is being done in the financing of the office and that we are not taking care of our employee. He stated the Grand Secretary has stated the faults in the budget and we have not seen these items fixed in the budget as the companions so expressed themselves during the last two days. He also feels a good copier machine is needed for that office. Companion Ward feels the incoming Grand High Priest must get control of this problem and see that it is taken care of and there be no more secret doings. Companion Walter Hammond made a motion that the budget committee be made to retire and make changes in the budget in the categories stated by the Grand Secretary, and that the Grand Secretary be allowed to make the decision of the copier even if it means going over the budgeted amount if necessary. The Grand Secretary made more suggestions on changes needed for the office budget. Companion Paul Friend then commented on the budget that we must remember this is a guideline and we should try to stay within our income. Companion Duane Young then stated that

the Grand Council and Grand Commandery budgets have already been passed and that there has been a raise in the per capita in the Chapter and Council this year and there will be more income this year than last. The motion to have the budget committee retire and change the budget was passed. Companion Frank Sender stated that although he is not a lawyer he believes that the law states for corporations that a budget meeting must be open to all and that they are to be notified in advance of said meeting, and that sending the committee out now is not legal, the same as original meeting, and maybe a lawyer here could comment on this. Companion Ed Price stated that he feels the budget should be originated in the office. Companion James Rudman stated that the budget is only a guide line and not set in stone. Also that maybe we should have legislation be presented to have the budget be sent out with proposed legislation before the convention to give companions time to study and make a knowledgeable decision on the budget.

The Grand High Priest reminded the companions that amendments for the Constitution are to be in by the first of February for all those who feel there needs to be some changes made.

M. Ex. Companion James B. Wall, PGHP, Executive Director of Royal Arch Research Assistance, was given the floor to present some awards. Companion Wall talked about the functions of RARA and the latest changes. E. Companion Wall then presented Jacksonville Chapter No. 12 with a 100% Certificate and a gold pin with one diamond and that this is the 3rd year they have won the award. E. Companions Virgil Brown and Steven Steele received Gold Certificates and pins with one diamond for contributing \$500 individually. Jericho Chapter No. 11 then received a Gold Certificate and a pin with one diamond, this is the eighteenth year in a row they have received this award. Then Halifax Chapter No. 5 received the Gold certificate, they were a little short of money to get the pin. Then Florida Chapter No. 1 received a Gold Certificate, the sixth time they have won. Then Clearwater Chapter No. 45 received the Gold Certificate and pin, this is their 25th year receiving this certificate and they are entitled to 15 diamonds in it. Then Bay County Chapter No. 39 received the Gold certificate and this is their 19th year of a 100% certificate winning this. Then Highlands Chapter No. 65 received their 100% certificate for the 7th year. Then Challenger Chapter No. 66 received their 100% certificate for the second year. Companion Wall then commented that last night at the banquet he presented MEGHP Glenn Chandler with his pin with 5 diamonds in it, and thanked him for his support not only as the Grand High Priest but also his personal support.

M. E. Companion Carl R. Truesdale, Deputy General Grand High Priest of the Southeastern Region, was then asked to speak. M. E. Companion thanked the companions of Florida for their hospitality they have given him and his lady during the last three years. He talked about the S.E. Conference in Tennessee, the Summer Assembly in North Carolina and the Triennial in South Dakota. He then spoke about the resolution passed last Triennial, on Perpetual Membership in the General Grand Chapter, and that its helps General Grand Chapter and your Grand Chapter.

M. E. Companion Edmund D. Harrison, Deputy General Grand High Priest for Latin America, was then asked to speak, he spoke on the situation of Masonry in South American Countries. He talked about his being a candidate for the

General Grand Scribe, the how he enjoyed the banquet sitting with the Grand Secretary Virgil Brown, who is extremely knowledgeable about masonry, his wife, the Carroll's and the great philosopher's of Florida Masonry, Companion Fred Piasecki and his lady. The room filled with laugher. He thanked Florida Companions for the kindness they have shown him.

Ex. Companion Gary Leazer, the editor of the Royal Arch Mason Magazine, spoke about bringing in new members. Generally those who are friends, coworkers or church members of Masons are the men that are joining. What we do outside the chapter may be more important then what we do inside the chapter. Sometimes our focus is on the budget, attendance and filing the offices and should be focused more on training and equipped to go out into the world an do the work we are suppose to be doing. In other words we should come to the meetings to be inspired, challenged and trained, so that when we are dismissed and leave we do not stop being Masons and our service to our community continues. From the time a man petitions and has been accepted in a lodge we should make sure that the whole family is included in the many various functions held at the lodge (dinners, socials events). There was a survey by the Atlanta Journal Constitution of men between the ages of 21 - 35, who were not members of any fraternity, as to their interest in being in a fraternity. There was a list of the many fraternities, one of those listed was Freemasonry, 70% of the men surveyed said they were interested in joining a fraternity for two reasons

- 1. That fraternity must offer them the opportunity to do something worthwhile in the community.
- That organization must have something to do with their wives and families.

The Moose lodges have changed their name to The Family Centers to help meet the wants of the new members. My friends sponsoring Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, Sea Scouts and different kinds of community organizations as well as work with veterans is one of the activities we should stress. In the Washington Post the writer Peterson Carlson, a non-mason, wrote a mostly positive article about Masonry, however he said "Masonic Rituals are deadly dull" he add that the same thing is done over and over again. Although there are many that love the rituals and regularly attend lodge, but what about the over 1.5 million masons that don't attend a lodge meeting, do they have the same love for the ritual and could that be the reasons they don't attend lodge. interviewed Dudley Davis in his article and for 17 years Davis worked with the Masonic Renewal Committee of America of North America. They published some excellent resources with suggestions for lodges and chapters who wanted to grow. But not much has been done about it. Davis recommends a book, "Bowling Alone" by a Harvard Professor, Robert Putnam. In this book he talks about how many organizations are losing members, not just fraternities. There are several reasons 1) Americans work longer hours: 2) TV and surfing the web keep Americans cocooned at home: 3) Americans are no longer a country of joiners. American men do not enjoy ritualistic work, elaborate initiations or special garb.

Davis felt we need to stop doing so much ritual work and start spending time in the community where they can be seen by men who might be inspired to join. He said titles, rituals, and dress do not appeal to men today when we have, cell

phones, TV, DVD's, satellite radio and a host of other electronic gadgets to occupy our time. Brother and Companions all, unless we move outside our fraternity wall to let people know who we are we will continue to decline instead of growing. When we hear about Masonic groups in other countries that are growing, makes me think and wonder what are we doing wrong here in America. Brethren there are great minds and great wisdom in this room and I do hope that those of you who have ideas, and not just you older men, some of the younger men who are coming along have ideas and just because they are different doesn't mean they are wrong, they are from a different generation and they might be able to appeal to the men of their generation. I have been a member of a Masonic family, for generations. My grandfather belonged to a chapter in 1914, and his dues were \$2 which in today's economy that would be about \$31. We think that is an awful lot of money, but I spend that much and more, without thinking about it, when I take my wife out to Red Lobster or most any restaurant. Friends if this organization is not worth the money it takes to operate it then let's close our doors and go to Red Lobster. But I think it is, and, if we are going to grow, we have got to decide if it is worthwhile and let's do something that will bring new life into our organization. Thank you very much.

The Grand High Priest then called for the report of the Budget Committee, the report was accepted as amended.

The Grand High Priest then asked that M. E. Grand High Priest, L. Aubrey Haynes, Sr., to come to the East and speak for the Distinguished Guests. He joked around about college football and the likeness to South Carolina and Florida. He is in agreement with Companion Leazer that we need to get out there and get new members. On behalf of the visitors he thanked Florida for their hospitality. He also invited everyone to Greenville, South Carolina next year for their convention.

The Grand High Priest then asked M. Ex. Companion Smokey J. Ferguson, General Grand Scribe to the East for comments. M. Ex. Companion Ferguson spoke of how he likes to come to visit the Grand Bodies of Florida and all the hospitality you have offered us.

The Grand Secretary announced that the office has available for all those interested for \$ 1.00 a disc with all three constitutions on it.

M. E. Companions H. Warren Almand, then gave the Jurisprudence Committee report. The report was accepted as read. M. E. Companion Almand then read the legislation for balloting:

- The resolution to adopt the Memorial Service from the General Grand Chapter Ritual and have it put in the Appendix "D", was passed.
- The resolution concerning balloting was considered not be in proper form and was withdrawn, to be resubmitted next year in proper form.
- 3. The resolution to set guidelines for the convocations and proceedings was adopted as written.
- This resolution was some simple housekeeping as to who gets copies of constituent chapters by-law changes, it was adopted as

read.

5. This resolution is on changing the name of Administrative Endowment Fund" finance" committee to "Investment" committee, it was adopted as read.

(See Grand Amendments section for actual amendments)

Ex. Companion Wm. Ronald Taylor gave the Necrology report and it was accepted as read. Companion Taylor then gave the report of the Religious, Civic and Patriotic Activities Committee, which was accepted as read.

Companion Paul Friend made a motion that Companion Gary Leazer be given an Honorary Membership in the Grand Chapter of Florida and the motion passed. The Grand High Priest announced that there are several copies of the reports/newsletters that are done by Companion Leazer and that they are great reading. He invited all companions to have a copy as long as they are available.

M. I. Grand Master, Donald Harriott, then made a presentation to a companion that was not able to be present at the Grand Assembly. Companion John Bouvier was presented the Ish Sodi Award.

R. Ex. Companion Duane Young asked to introduce a distinguished guest, not introduced in the morning, due to his late arrival. Most Ex. Companion Richard I. Lanier, Past Grand High Priest from Jacksonville was recognized.

Companion Ralph Vaughan stated that he is distress in that he is the care taker of a money tree and that it is wilting and needs more green fertilizer and if he could put in the east the maybe if would get a lot more fertilizer and start growing.

The Grand Secretary announced that he would like to remind all committee chairmen to give him a written copy of their reports. He also announced that he still has 3 secretary packages that have not been picked-up.

The Grand High Priest then presented 50-Year Service awards to Companions Billy Collier and George T. Collier. At the end of the presentation service they were given Grand Honors.

The M. E. Grand High Priest, Glenn Chandler then presented Certificates of Appreciation to Vernon E. Adams, George T. Collier, Gerald H. Favor, Paul W. Friend, Alan J. Graulich, Walter M. Hammond, Charles L. Hollinger, Fred M. Morris, Douglas A. Noden, James P. Rudman, William Ronald Taylor, and Charles W. Warren. The Grand High Priest commented that he thanked Chris for excellent work on designing the certificates that had his logo on them and that they were so beautiful, he almost gave his self one.

The Grand High Priest then presented the awards to the chapters. (See Awards Section). The Grand High Priest then presented Grand Representative Commissions to his appointments. (See GHP Report).

The Grand High Priest then stated that he had wanted to present some legislation to recognize individual companions for exceptional service, but was unable to get it completed due to his busy schedule. So, he is calling it the

"Grand High Priest Distinguished Service Award." It is not an official award but something he wanted to do. If you have traveled to the District Meetings you know I have talked a lot about Masonic books and my favorite is Coil's Masonic Encyclopedia. This is always close to where I sleep due to my love of this book. I am presenting one each of these books to Companions Wilbur R. Allen, Paul W. Friend and Steven Q. Steele for their service on special projects during the year.

Tampa-Cushing Chapter No. 3 presented the Grand High Priest a check for \$927.28 for RARA.

The Grand High Priest then gave the check to R. E. Companion Virgil Brown the chairman of RARA.

The Grand High Priest asked the E. Grand Historian, Dr. Peter J. Millheiser to deliver The Grand Historian Lecture, "Passing the Veils: It's Historical Development and Symbolism." There will be copies available at the conclusion of the lecture for those that are interested. Ex. Companion Steve Steele made a motion that his presentation be accepted as read and printed in its proceedings.

R. E. William Wyllie, Grand King then presented a check for \$576.55 from the ladies bazaar table and the hospitality room for the charities. The Grand High Priest announced that the total sales of the Ladies Baskets that were auctioned came to \$2,278, for our charities. We thank all the ladies.

Companion Luther Bodiford then gave the Committee on Thanks Committee report and it was adopted as read.

The Grand High Priest then called a list of companions that have gifts from the outgoing officers in the office and reminded them to please pick them up.

The Time and Place committee report was given by M.I. Grand Master Donald Harriott, for William Wyllie, it was accepted as read.

The M. E. Grand High Priest, Glenn Chandler then opened the floor for the election of Officers,

M. E. Companion Floyd Ziegler, PGHP made a motion that M. E. Companion Duane Young cast the unanimous ballot for William F Wyllie for Grand High Priest. R. E. Companion Wyllie accepted. M. E. Companion David Wilkinson, PGHP made a motion that M. E. Companion Harvey L. Ward, Sr. cast the unanimous ballot for R. E. Companion Michael A. Padron for Grand King. R. E. Companion Padron accepted. M. E. Companion Duane Young made a motion that M. E. Companion Virgil Brown cast the unanimous ballot for R. E. Companion Wilbur R Allen for R. E. Grand Scribe. R. E. Companion Allen accepted. M. E. Companion Floyd Ziegler made a motion that R. E. Companion Wilbur Allen cast the unanimous ballot for M. E. Companion Duane Young for Grand Treasurer. M. E. Companion Young accepted. M. E. Also of great importance was the One Day Statewide Class held on April 9th at the Orlando Scottish Rite Masonic Center in Honor of the Grand Master. Under the outstanding guidance of M.I. Paul W. Friend, seventy-five Companions were Exalted into the sublime and honorable degree of Royal Arch Mason!

The forty-one Chartered Chapters that make up "The Most Excellent Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida" are a varied group. Some are doing extremely well while others barely have enough Companions to open. The present and future condition of Royal Arch Masonry in the Sunshine State is entirely up to you and me. The Exaltation of new members is an absolute necessity. However, we should not forsake our faithful corps of sideline Companions. While we continue to lose more members than we gain, I honestly feel that the quality and character of the candidate is more important today than it ever has been. The Reverend Dr. James Anderson got it right over two hundred and eighty two years ago in his 1723 Constitutions. He states that, "The persons admitted Members of a Lodge must be good and true Men, freeborn and of mature and discreet Age, no Bondmen, no Women, no immoral or scandalous Men, but of good Report." Amen, so mote it be!

We must be progressive for our Chapters to grow and maintain interest and enthusiasm. The destiny of a Chapter is in the hands of its officers. Upon the officers, and especially the High Priest, depends the success or failure, of a Chapter. The office of High Priest is termed Excellent but to be considered that he must set goals and strive to attain them. One person can make a difference! If you don't have a T-Board then create an Email list to notify members of all events. Have quarterly officer meetings to keep everyone on the same page. Start on time but quit by nine. The Chapters that serve a sumptuous meal prior to their meetings and have a regular program of Masonic Education appear to

have better attendance than those who don't. In whatever you do, there must be uniformity.

I am deeply concerned about many constituent Chapters using palm cards and open rituals during the opening and closing of the Chapter at the stated Convocations. I feel that it dishonors the Tabernacle and our ancient Brethren. It is hard to understand why Companions serving as Masters of the Veils are unable to learn four short sentences! The importance of our District Schools of Instruction cannot be overstated. We all need it!

I was distressed to learn that while the Grand Lodge of Florida has about 55,000 Freemasons, the Grand Chapter has only about 5,500 Companions. Evidently, we have forgotten the old maxim, if you don't tell it, you can't sell it! The York Rite Story must be told to our Symbolic Lodge Brothers. Companions, if we don't promote and perpetuate ourselves, then who will?

GRAND TREASURER'S PRELIMINARY REPORT – 4/20/05

There were three major changes to the usual financial status of the bodies during the 2004-2005 fiscal year. They involved (1) the establishment of Sacred Funds (Bond investment) accounts in the Chapter and the Council, (Commandery had established them earlier) (2) The change of Financial

Advisors for the Chapter and Council, and (3) The Hurricane/Owner forced change of Grand Office location – with resultant higher rent.

The BUDGET PERFORMANCE is generally running true to form – The budget for the last few years has exceeded the anticipated income, however frugality on the part of the Grand Officers has limited expenditures so that the difference between income and outgo has been such that no Body (while each dipped into some capital) is in real fiscal trouble. The need for the recent per-capita increase in all three was accented by the fact that it was necessary to withdraw \$5,000 to \$7,000 of investments per body to cover year-end expenditures prior to the receipt of the new per-capita.

As to items (1) and (2), the investment committees have had a history of difficulty in reaching a consensus as to how the monies should be invested. Initially, (in 2002) by direction the funds languished in checking accounts for a considerable time until the investment decisions were made. Even then, at last minute the Commandery chose to break with the other two bodies and use a different Investment Advisor. During this past year, it became almost a unanimous view that the Chapter and Council Investment Advisor should be changed. (The previous Advisor was reluctant to respond to our wishes as to investing and also refused to attend Investment Advisors meetings to consider our wishes) After reviewing proposal from several potential Advisors, a lengthy conference call resulted in the choice of The Edward Jones firm as the new Advisor for the Chapter and Council.

Again, there was lack of consensus as to the guidelines to be applied to the accounts. After we had closed the previous accounts, the Advisor indicated that he could not provide the income indicated in the conference call without purchasing bonds at a premium in order to achieve the desired yield. The lack of consensus resulting caused one of the talented members of the Investment Committee to resign. Following that resignation, Investment Committee recommendations and subsequent Grand Head instructions were issued not to micromanage the Investment Advisor, but to go along with his advice.

The net result of these actions is that the Administrative, Live and Perpetual Membership and other "Sacred Funds" of the Chapter and Council are securely invested in bonds to provide slightly above the promised 5% yield. The downside is that in order to achieve this, bonds were bought at a premium, and have a current face value of less than the amount invested. The light at the end of that tunnel may be that in some 5-8 years the extra interest will repay the premium and for several years the interest rate will be better. Since a portion of the General Funds is also invested in Bonds, the same type of reduction in the Corpus is evident there.

As to item (3), the combination of Hurricane damage and the desire of the property owner to sell the office facility, prompted the need for a different location. It is understood that the most reasonable facility was located nearby, but at an increase in rental of approximately three times over. This has resulted in the expenditures for rent in each of the budgets to exceed the budgeted amount.

The Commandery Investment Advisor is considered satisfactory and no changes are known to be planned in that area.

Companions, we need to work harder to get new members and to retain those we lost due to NPD.

We had 75 candidates go through the one-day class in Orlando on April 9th. This is more than we exalted all last year. I have heard reports from over the state that the class stirred up some interest in York Rite. We need to take advantage of this by holding District festivals and/or regular (slow) classes in the local bodies.

This past year has been a real eye-opener for me. I had not realized the amount of work needed to run the office, much of it in areas in which I have had no experience.

The three hurricanes that came through Titusville did not help matters much. Hurricane "Charlie" did some hidden damage that led to the severe damage caused by "Jeanne". In preparing for Hurricane "Francis", we placed almost everything in the Office in large heavy plastic bags. This Hurricane brought down most of the ceiling tiles on the second floor of the east side, and all the tiles next to the East wall on the first floor.

After the hurricane, we found two 5 x 10 storage units in Cocoa, and moved the 10 filing cabinets containing the old irreplaceable records and other important records, as well as some of the museum items. All of the Museum was stacked in the back room on our side of the building. Hurricane "Jeanne" ripped a large hole in the roof and brought down all the ceiling tiles on the second floor and the east side of the first floor. Fortunately, we occupied the West side of first floor, and only had some water run down the back wall.

Christine and I thank you for the support and sympathy we received from most, though not all, of you.

We have created two new databases this year. One, which will allow us to have a better and continuous view of the statistics of the various Chapters; and, will make it easier to calculate the annual returns, provided the local Secretaries

submit their monthly reports. This database had some flaws (my fault) that did not show up until we tried to use it this year. We have since corrected those flaws.

The other will replace the old membership database; and, will make it easier to make the various sorts we need to prepare printouts, etc. for the Chapters. It will also allow us to keep better track of the Plural memberships; and the service time of our members, provided we are given their exaltation dates. It will take some time to load the date from the old database into it however.

All local Secretaries are invited to visit the Office to review their records, and help us update them. Please remember that any change in membership numbers must be backed up a report of the individual's membership changes. (i.e., exaltation, transfer, demit, death, etc.)

In May, we had a CPA attempt to set up the Office Account in the Quickbooks accounting system. The system was set up, but was not adequate for our needs. It was more useful for a small profit and loss business. Bob had previously tried to have various people try to set up such a system, none succeeded.

This year we placed the Constitution and Regulations of all three Grand Bodies on a Disc, which can be distributed at a very low cost to the Bodies and our members.

After this Grand York Rite Convention, we plan to have the Constitution and Regulations updated and on discs along with the Proceedings of all three Bodies. While some of our members will still want printed copies, many prefer to have this information on Discs. This should give us considerable savings in printing.

I recommend that we consider going back to the old membership record keeping used prior to the mid 1980's. The Grand York Rite Office did not maintain these records. Each local secretary/recorder maintained his own records, and submitted a complete alphabetic list of his members (names only), and calculated his own annual returns using the forms given him by this Office. This is the method used by most states.

I recommend that the budget system be changed, so that the funds to run this Office are carried as one or two line items in the budgets of the three Grand Bodies. And that a comprehensive budget be established with line items that more closely match the various expenditures made by the Office. This would make it easier to write checks against the proper line items; and, would make the Audit easier and more comprehensive.

I further recommend that the cost of the copier be removed from the proceedings line item and be given its own line-item number. This would reflect a more realistic cost of doing the proceedings.

Thank you for letting us serve you this past year.

GRAND COMMITTEE REPORTS

AUDIT COMMITTEE REPORT

On March 4, 2005, The Audit Committee for 2003-04 consisting of Wilbur R. Allen and William F. Wyllie met with Duane B. Young, R. Ex. Grand Treasurer and Virgil P. Brown, R. Ex. Grand Secretary, at the Grand York Rite office in Titusville, Florida. Also in attendance were the members of the audit committees of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Florida and the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Florida. The purpose of the meeting was to audit the financial records of the Grand Secretary.

As we reported at the 157th Annual Grand Convocation, we had reviewed the records of the Grand Treasurer and the records of the Grand Secretary were not available for audit.

During the past two days you have heard the reports from the Audit Committees of the Grand Council and Grand Commandery. They have explained the problems that were found during the course of their examination of the records. These problems have been discussed fully in the other two Grand Sessions and we do not feel that it will be of any benefit to continue that discussion. Let it suffice, that the problems that exist in the Council and Commandery records also exist in the Chapter records. Let us turn our attention to correcting the situation.

It is our recommendation that the following steps be taken immediately:

- An accounting program be purchased and installed on the computer in the Grand York Rite office. This program will be used to record the financial transactions of the Grand York Rite Bodies.
- 2. The "Office" checking account is to become an impress account with a balance of \$250.00. An imprest account is used to make small purchases/payments when it would not be feasible to write warrants. The imprest account would be reimbursed upon the presentation of invoices and receipt to the Grand Treasurer.
- 3. Employees are not to be signers on any bank accounts.
- 4. Fax machines are to be purchased for the use of the presiding officers of the three grand bodies during their year in office. Warrants and copies of invoices will be faxed to the Presiding officers for their approval before payment is made. When they sign their approval, they will fax the invoice/warrant to the Grand Treasurer for payment.
- 5. The fax machines will be the property of the Grand York Rite and passed to the succeeding presiding officers.

Companions, we have had problems in our office but these situations can be repaired. Let us be positive and empower our presiding officers with the mandate to make the necessary changes to correct the deficiencies in the accounting system.

The GRAND HISTORIAN LECTURE

Passing the Veils: Its Historical Development and Symbolism
By Dr. Peter John Millheiser, Ex. Grand Historian 2004-2005
The Most Excellent Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida

May 07, 2005 A.D., 2535 A.I.

Some of the most fascinating changes that have occurred in the Royal Arch ritual have been those of the legends of the vault and the veils. Philostorgius, the fourth century great historian, wrote that as the Roman Emperor, Julian was attempting to rebuild the city of Jerusalem, a stone was dislodged revealing a hidden vault. Workmen were lowered into the vault, whose dimensions formed a perfect square. One of the workmen struck his foot against a column upon which was a book wrapped in a fine linen cloth. His companions outside the vault then pulled this workman up by a rope tied around his waist. The book appeared new and written in the book in large letters was the Gospel of John "In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Words was God."

There were other variations of the vault legend. In the book of *Enoch*, Enoch had a vision from God of nine vaults and he proceeded to build a secret sanctuary based on the plan that he had been revealed to him. The vaults were built one under the other and in the ninth or lowest vault was a triangle of the purist gold upon which was inscribed the name of God.

The rituals of both the vault legend and the Passing of the Veils changed through Masonic history, being de-Christianized in both England and the United States in the 18th and early 19th centuries.

In the Bible, there are various references to the veil of the temple. In *Exodus* 26: 31-33, it was written:

"And thou shalt make a veil of blue and purpose and scarlet and fine twined linen of cunning work: with cherubim shall it be made: And thou shalt hang it upon four pillars of shittim wood overlaid with gold... And thou shalt hang up the veil under the taches, that thou mayest bring in thither within the veil the ark of the testimony: and the veil shall divide unto you between the holy place and the most holy."

Flavius Josephus in the Antiquities of the Jew, (3:7:7) described the veils of the tabernacle whose colors represented the four elements from which the earth was created.

The veils too were composed of four things, they declared the four elements; for the fine linen was proper to signify the earth, because the flax grows out of the earth; the purple signified the sea, because that color is dyed by the blood of a sea-shellfish.; the blue is fit to signify the air; and the scarlet will naturally be an indication of fire."

The symbolism of the veils was important in the New Testament. In *Matthew 27:51*, it was written: "And, behold, the veil of the temple was rent in twain from the top to the bottom: and the earth did quake, and the rocks rent" In *Hebrews 10:19, 20*, the veil is referred to as the flesh of Jesus. "By a new and living way, which he hath consecrated for us, through his veil which is to say his flesh . . ."

In the late 18th century England, Chapter minutes, as well as various manuscripts, contain records of the working of the Passing of the Veils. The Passing of the Veils was not a universal custom in the early English Chapter degrees and the ceremony fell into abeyance in the 19th century. The Passing of the Veils was most commonly practiced in England in the period when the Royal Arch was still a Trinitarian Christian degree. The degree was de-Christianized, first with the union of the Grand Chapters of the Antients and Moderns in 1813, and subsequently with a more extensive reworking of the Chapter degrees in 1834-35.

In the reworking of the English Chapter degrees in 1813 and 1834-35, the Excellent Master degree, in which the Passing of the Veils took place, was abandoned and the ceremony of the Veils in England generally fell into disuse. In the United States, the Excellent Master degree was also dropped from the Chapter degrees in the revision of the degrees at the beginning of the formation of the General Grand Chapter in 1797. Unlike England, the Passing of the Veils continued to be a part of the Royal Arch Degree in the United States, even though the Excellent Master degree was no longer worked.

However, the Passing of the Veils did not fully disappear in England. Some English Chapters continued to work the ceremony as part of Royal Arch Masonry. Utilizing the minutes and the treasurer's books of some of the Yorkshire Chapters, such as the Chapter of Affability, it was found that the ceremony of the veils continued to be used until at least the 1860's.

The Passing of the Veils in England, when practiced following the reforms of 1834-35, generally occurred with the Exaltation. These two ceremonies were held on the same day and the Passing of the Veils preceded the Exaltation. However, in a number of cases, the Exaltation preceded the Passing of the Veils by as much as four years.

By the latter part of the 19th century, there is no evidence that the Veils ceremony was still being worked in England. However, in 1899, masons in Bristol, in the west of England, decided to research the Passing of the Veils and to reincorporate it into the Royal Arch Degree. There was no information about the ceremony that they could find. Ernest Henry Cook, who was the last surviving member of this group of masons, some 30 years later, described how they recreated the ritual. Initially three veils were suspended in an anteroom

adjoining the Chapter room. A fourth veil was subsequently added. It is unclear if the ceremony of the veils worked in the 19th century in England was the same as the pre-union workings of the 18th and very early 19th centuries.

The ceremony that we can recreate from the 19th century consisted of the Junior Scribe conducting the candidate and giving four knocks at the door of the First Veil. The High Priest read from the third chapter of *Exodus*, versus 1 to 6, concerning the Burning Bush, at which point the bandage was removed from the candidate's eyes. This was followed by the 13th and 14th verses of the same chapter.

At the second veil, the readings were of the serpent and of Aaron's rod. The passwords were Moses, Aaron, and Eleazer. Within the third veil, the miracles of the leprous hand and the pouring of water on the dry land were discussed. The candidate was then shown the various holy articles and was able to present himself as a Sojourner.

The working of the Passing of the Veils is still performed in other countries. In Ireland, there are four veils beyond which sit the principal officers of the Chapter. The Royal Arch Captain sits in front of the white veil and there is a Captain of each veil. The Irish ceremony seems to be the one most closely related to the American ceremony, both of which use four veils. The veils ceremony is also worked in Scotland, and in parts of Canada and Australia. In Queensland, Australia, the signs of the veils are similar to the American signs, but are actually enacted in the Most Excellent Master Degree. The candidate is taught the grips which accompany the signs of the three veils. The candidate, however, does not pass through the white veil.

In the United States, Royal Arch Masonry made an early appearance. The first recorded minutes of a Royal Arch exaltation in the world were in the lode in Fredericksburg, Virginia, on December 22, 1753, when Daniel Campbell, Robert Hatherston, and Alexander Wodrons were raised to the degree of Royal Arch Mason. This was the same lodge in which George Washington was initiated on November 4, 1753. A Royal Arch Chapter was also held in Philadelphia in 1758. St. Andrews Royal Arch Chapter in Massachusetts, in the 18th century, originally worked four degrees, the Excellent, Super-Excellent, Royal Arch, and Knight Templar degrees. These degrees were all given in one night.

In 1797, plans were made to form the General Grand Chapter, which then proceeded to reconcile differences, which existed in the rituals used by the various American Chapters. Under the leadership of Thomas Smith Webb, the Chapter ritual was standardized to the format of the four degrees used today.

The symbolism of the veils is complex. In the second book of *Chronicles 3:14*, describes how Solomon made the veil of the temple of fine linen in blue, purple, and crimson. The same colors used in the veils were also worked into the robes of the High Priest. The passage through the veils is a passage to the sacred place (the Holiest of Holies) to receive spiritual illumination. This illumination is also a Masonic allegory. Passing through the veils is a symbol of the trials and difficulties that are encountered in the search for Truth. As the veils separated the Holy places from the Holiest of Holies, which was regarded as a heaven peculiar to God, so the veil screening the Holiest of Holies was also the boundary between earth and heaven.

Blue is the symbol of friendship and benevolence, which is the first step in the search for Truth. As the blue of the sky represents the threshold of heaven, so the blue veil is the threshold of the mystical passageway through the veils to illumination.

Purple, the symbol of union of the colors blue and red, refers to the connection of Craft and Royal Arch Masonry. This is the color of the intermediate degrees.

The scarlet veil, which is symbolic of fervency and zeal, shows that the candidate has advanced and will be successful in his journey from darkness to light. Red is the basic symbol of the strength, vitality, and power of life. The name Adam in Hebrew is closely related to the Hebrew word for red and so red is symbolic of the vitality of Adam, which has continued throughout time.

White is the universal symbol of purity and teaches the candidate that only by purity of life can he expect to be worthy of receiving the Divine Truth. To Plato, white was the color of the gods. At the transfiguration of Jesus on Mount Tabor, his clothes became dazzling white. The word candidate means one dressed in white and white is the color of initiation. In Hebrew, the word for white is related to the word for perfection.

Only after going through the illumination of the veils, is one entitled to receive the Signet of Truth, enabling him to pass the final veil separating the Holy from the Holiest of Holies. The Passing of the Veils symbolizes the mystical journey to illumination and enlightenment. An old Lancastershire English Craft Lecture about 1800 noted that the Veil of the Temple signified Jesus hanging upon the Alter of the cross as the true veil between God and man, shadowing man with his wounds and blood.

"Taking the Veil" has also been a symbol of separating a life with God from that of the outside world, as when a nun "takes the veil". In Islam, the veil divides the damned from the chosen. The Sufi Moslems state that a person is veiled when he cannot perceive the Divine Light in his heart. In Buddhism, there is a veil, *Maya*, which conceals the ultimate reality. The veil is also protective, as the unscreened Light of Truth could be blinding. Moses covered his face at the burning bush to shade his eyes. To the Moslems, the face of God is veiled by 70 thousand curtains of light and darkness without which everything God gazed upon would be burned up. The veil can also be seen as a method of communication as it only partially conceals, permitting some light to penetrate the veil. Another interpretation is that the veils represented the sufferings of the Jewish people in returning from Babylonian exile.

Illumination from within, based on the passing through the veils, is an alchemical interpretation. The object of the alchemical art is the uncovering of the inner faculty of wisdom, removing the veils, which separate the mind from its hidden divine root.

The Passing of the Veils ceremony is therefore an intense, religiously inspired, allegory. In the United States, the ceremony is an integral part of the Royal Arch Degree. In England, as part of the move away from Trinitarian Christian ritual, the Passing of the Veils was virtually eliminated. The ceremony continues to be practiced in Scotland and Ireland and the Irish ceremony bears

considerable similarity to the American ceremony. The Passing of the Veils also exists in other areas in which Masonry was influenced by Britain, such as in Canada and Australia. The ceremony was brought back in Bristol, England in the very early part of the 20^{th} century. However, there has not been any move to bring it back elsewhere in England. The Passing of the Veils is not only a beautiful ceremony, but conveys the rich spiritual message of the mystical Masonic journey through the boundary separating earth and heaven, to illumination and enlightenment.

INVESTMENT COMMITTEE

The Investment Committee had a very busy and productive year. An assessment of the Grand Chapter financial objectives was made and it was determined that they were not being met by the brokerage firm where our funds were invested. Additionally, the asset allocation was not being managed to our satisfaction or within the guidelines of the Grand Chapter's bylaws. This condition placed the committee in a research mode and motivated it to arrive at recommendations that would correct the situation, ensuring a safer investment of our funds, while achieving Grand Chapter objectives.

Numerous Email discussions transpired among the committeemen concerning actions to be considered and a meeting was scheduled for September 4, 2005 in Jacksonville, to resolve the situation that faced us. This meeting was subsequently cancelled. This was due to a lady named Francis, who struck havoc across the state. This was one of the many hurricanes that devastated Florida and its residents during the season. Much of central Florida was without power for over a week and had barely recovered before the next storm, Jeanne, even more severely hit many of the same communities again.

On the morning of the District 5 and 6 Area meeting, the joint Grand Chapter and Grand Council Investment Committees' met at 10:00A.M. November 13, 2004 at Harbor City Lodge No. 318, in Melbourne, Florida. After a lengthy discussion of the direction the investments should take, it was decided to liquidate the Sacred Funds segment of the investments and place them in the money market portion of the accounts. This was the first step in the closeout of the Morgan Stanley accounts and a move to hasten the reinvestment process. A joint conclusion of the member's of this committee and the Grand Councils' Investment Committee, found that the funds would be better managed if a new brokerage firm could be found to achieve our objectives. The next scheduled meeting of the committee was to have taken place in Orlando on December 8, but due to conflicting schedules, a recommendation was made by the chairman to conduct teleconferencing meetings with various brokers.

On December 10, 2004 a telecon was conducted with representatives of Raymond James and on December 21, 2004 a similar telecon was conducted with several representatives of Edward Jones. Both organizations had prepared for our discussions and questions were satisfactorily answered. A decision to reinvest with Edward Jones was made on December 27, 2004 and the process began in January 2005. By the February 2005 reporting period, the funds had been transferred and invested whereby the Sacred Funds have been placed in fixed asset instruments the will ensure meeting, and exceeding the minimum income objectives as set forth in the Bylaws and Constitution of the Grand Chapter R.A.M. of Florida. The General fund assets were re-invested in the asset allocation proportions originally set as the guideline for combined equity and fixed assets. The market has been in a volatile state and only the effects of time, stable oil prices and a non-inflationary environment will determine the decisions of the incoming committeemen.

The current value on the Grand Chapter investments at the March 31, 2005 reporting period were as follows:

General Funds: \$197,339.00 Sacred Funds: \$82,105.23 Total Funds: \$279,444.23

The Investment Committee would like to thank the M.E. Grand High Priest, Glenn E. Chandler for the privilege of serving the Grand Chapter. We would also like to thank the Grand Treasurer and Grand Recorder for acting on the decisions conveyed by this committee and directed by the Grand High Priest, ensuring that our funds were transferred and reinvested in a timely manner and their untiring assistance in the selection and re-investment process.

JURISPRUDENCE COMMITTEE REPORT

The Jurisprudence Committee met with Most Excellent Glenn E. Chandler, Most Excellent Grand High Priest, on May 4, 2005, at the Orlando Marriott at Lake Mary to review his Grand High Priest's Report and his activities during the last Capitular year. The Committee found that the Grand High Priest, in all cases, acted in accordance with the <u>Constitution and Regulations of the Grand Chapter, Royal Arch Masons of Florida</u> and within the prerogatives of his office.

The Committee examined six (6) Dispensation Requests, all of which were in proper form and properly sealed and approved Eleven (11) Bylaws Changes were examined, all but one of which was in proper form and properly approved; one was denied because it was not in proper form. During his term in office, Most Excellent Companion Chandler also issued one (1) Proclamation, two (2) Edicts, and two (2) Executive Orders, all of which were also in keeping with the Constitution and Regulations.

The Committee considered one (1) Ruling and Decision. Most Excellent Companion Chandler received an inquiry about whether a Chapter Degree had to be completed in one Convocation, or if part of it could be conferred at a later Convocation. The Grand High Priest consulted each member of the Jurisprudence Committee and some other Past Grand High Priests for their reactions and opinions, and researched all he could find in the Constitution and Regulations and the Grand Lodge of Florida Constitution and Regulations. The Ruling and Decision, which was accompanied with documentation from the above named sources, reads: "The Excellent High Priest shall not permit a section of any Degree to be postponed until a future Convocation of the Chapter. Any Degree started in a Convocation must be completed, which shall include a lecture of the Degree, if possible." The Jurisprudence Committee was unanimous in its agreement with and support of the Ruling and Decision.

The Committee reviewed five (5) Amendments to the <u>Constitution and Regulations</u>. Four were found to be in proper form; the author of the fifth graciously withdrew his Amendment Proposal when informed of its deficiencies, and will rewrite and resubmit at next year's Annual Convocation.

Most Excellent Companion Chandler made seven (7) Recommendations, all of which are a continuation of existing programs or being considered for implementation.

Most Excellent Companion Chandler represented this Grand Chapter well on his visits to other Grand Jurisdictions. While his number of visitations was limited, he made each visit a quality, well thought out one.

The Jurisprudence Committee commends our Most Excellent Grand Priest for his meticulous and timely consideration and attention to all details of any business that came before him. Most Excellent Companion Chandler put a lot of time and thought into all that he did.

Each member of this Jurisprudence Committee expresses his personal pleasure for the privilege and honor of serving this Grand Royal Arch Chapter and this Grand High Priest.

It has been suggested that the more of the printing be done by sub-contractors, to give you an idea of what the cost difference is, I am giving you the figures from both:

This saving alone, not counting any other items, more than pays for the copier. These items before this copier would take a week with volunteers collating and stapling the items, which the copier does automatically. So it not only saves money, it saves time. The current contract for the copier is up in June and we should consider getting a newer model, under the lease plan. During the five years of this lease they have replaced the drum 3 times (expensive item), the lease locks in the maintenance costs so that there is no increase of toners or repairs no matter what goes wrong. We copy at least 120,000 – 180,000 items a year. The above items only cover one event and only a small part of the copying done in the office.

REPORT ON RELIGIOUS AFFIRMATION DAY

To the Most Excellent Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida:

By proclamation dated the 3rd day of May 2005, the Most Excellent Grand High Priest of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida designated Religious Affirmation Day be observed by the Constituent Chapters at a religious service during the Month of October.

The High Priests, of the Constituent Chapters, were allowed to hold their service on the day and at the place which would most accommodate the needs of their members and families. It was hoped that this would increase participation in this important aspect of Capitular Masonry.

I would recommend more communications between the Grand Scribe and the Constituent Chapters in promoting this program.

Therefore, be it further resolved, that this ritual be added to Appendix D as *(new)* Chapter 10 to minimize any changes in our Grand chapter Rules and Regulations. The effective date for this additional chapter shall be upon approval by the 158th Grand Convocation of the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons of Florida.

ROYAL ARCH COMPANION FUNERAL CEREMONIES

PART I.

H.P.-If a man die, shall be live again?

Response by Chaplain or Companions—The dust shall return to the earth as it was, and the spirit to God who gave it.

H.P.—When he dieth shall he carry anything away with him?

Response—He brought nothing into the world, and it is certain he can carry nothing out.

H.P.—The Lord gave, and the Lord hath taken away; blessed is the name of the Lord.

Response—God is our God forever. He will be our guide and support

through the valley of the shadow of death.

H.P.—Dearly beloved friends and brethren know this that Almighty God is the Lord of life and death, and of all things to them pertaining; whether in youth or age, in strength or weakness, in health or sickness, the issues are all with him. Wherefore, whatsoever your affliction may be, know you certainly that it is God's visitation. And for what cause so ever this sorrow may be sent upon you, and though it be grievous to bear, yet the Lord is merciful and gracious, yea, plenteous in mercy.

For as heaven is high above the earth, so great is his mercy towards them that fear him. For he knoweth our frame, he remembereth that we are dust. He healeth the broken in heart, and bindeth up their wounds. God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble.

As in life our brother and companion was true and steadfast, so in death do we inscribe the records of his memory and his virtues upon the tablets of our hearts, where friendship still lingers in sad yet pleasant reminiscence.

The Secretary may now read the record upon which has been inscribed the name, date of death, and age of the deceased companion, together with such other particulars in his Masonic history, or remarks as will be proper.

Chaplain—I heard a voice from Heaven, saying unto me, Write: From henceforth blessed are the dead who die in the Lord; even so saith the Spirit; for they rest from their labors. Almighty Father, in thy hands we leave, with humble submission, the soul of our deceased companion. Amen.

The will of God is accomplished. *All say*—Amen.

Hear my prayer, Jehovah, hear. Listen to my humble cries; See the day of trouble near, heavy on my soul it lies.

Hide not, thy gracious face When the storm around me falls; Hear me, O thou God of Grace, In the time thy servant calls.

Prayer By Chaplain

O blessed Lord, the Father of all mercies, and the God of all comfort, we beseech thee, look down in pity upon us, and especially upon this afflicted and bereaved family. O merciful God, thou who hast written thy Holy Word for our instruction, that we through patience and the comfort of thy Holy Scriptures might have hope, give us a right understanding of ourselves and of thy promises, that we may not lose confidence in Thee. Give to us and to those near and dear to our deceased companion, strength against all distress of body, and mind, and spirit. Break not the bruised reed. Shut not up thy tender mercies, but make us to know thy goodness, and that thou will come again with gladness. Lift upon us the light of thy countenance and save us with everlasting salvation. Amen.

Response—As it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen

BENEDICTION

Chaplain—The Lord bless us and keep us; the Lord make his face to shine upon us, and be gracious unto us; the Lord lift upon us the light of his countenance, and give us peace.

PART II.

The procession will now be reformed and escort the body of the deceased to the grave; the High Priest, Chaplain and Officers take their station at the head, the mourners at the foot of the grave.

The companions should form in a circle around the grave, if possible.

The following may be read by the Chaplain—or, if well sung, the effect will be good.

LESSON

Lord, make me to know mine end, and the measure of my days, what it is; that I may know how frail I am. Behold, thou hast made my days as a hand-breadth; and mine age is nothing before thee; verily every man at his best state is altogether vanity. Surely every man walketh in a vain show; surely they are disquieted in vain; he heapeth up riches, and knoweth not who shall gather them.

And now, Lord, what wait I for? My hope is in thee. Remove thy stroke away from me; I am consumed by the blow of thine hand. When thou with rebukes dost correct man for iniquity, thou makest his beauty to consume away like a moth, surely every man is vanity. Hear my prayer, O Lord, and give ear unto my cry; hold not thy peace at my tears; for I am stranger with thee, and a sojourner, as all my fathers were. O spare me, that I may recover strength, before I go hence and be no more.

[OR THIS]

Lord, thou hast been our dwelling-place in all generations. Before the mountains were brought forth, or ever thou hadst formed the earth and the world; even from everlasting to everlasting, thou are God. Thou turnest man to destruction; and sayest, Return, ye children of men. For a thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday when it is past, and as a watch in the night. Thou carriest them away as with a flood; they are as asleep; in the morning they are like grass which groweth up. in the morning it flourisheth, and groweth up; in the evening it is cut down, and withereth. The days of our years are threescore and ten; and if by reason of strength they be fourscore years, yet is their strength labor and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away. So teach us to number our days that we may apply our hearts unto wisdom.

H.P.—Man that is born of a woman is of few days, and full of trouble.

Response—He cometh forth like a flower, and is cut down, he fleeth as a shadow and continueth not.

H.P.—See his days are determined; the number of his months are with thee; thou hast appointed his bounds, that he cannot pass.

Companions, man goeth forth to his work and to his labor until the evening of his day. The labors of our companion are now ended; with him there is now no more counsel or device; and we are here assembled to introduce him to the place prepared for all living; solemn and impressive as is the survey of human life, its lights and shades are so blended as to teach us that all on earth is change. As the lightning writes its fiery path on the dark cloud and soon

expires, so the race of man, walking amid the shades of mortality, glitters for a moment through the dark gloom, then vanishes from our sight forever.

But, is this the end of man, and the expiring hope of faithful Masons? No; thanks be to God, who giveth us the victory! As the embers of mortal life are feebly glimmering in the socket of existence, the doctrines contained in the Great Light of our profession remove the dark cloud, draw aside the sable curtains of the tomb, and awaken hope and joy to sustain and cheer the departing spirit.

Forasmuch as it has pleased Almighty God to take unto himself the soul of our departed brother, we therefore commit his body to the ground; earth to earth, dust to dust, ashes to ashes, in the sure and certain hope that this corruption must put on incorruption, and this mortal put on immortality.

The High Priest will now deposit the white apron or lambskin in the grave and say:

Naked came I into the world and naked I return. The Lord gave and the Lord hath taken away; blessed be the name of the Lord.

This sprig of evergreen which we are about to deposit in the grave of our departed companion is an emblem of hope—and teaches us to look forward to the enjoyment of that far better and immortal part which survives the grave, and which shall never, never die.

The companions will now move around the grave, deposit the evergreen and again halt in place, during which the following may be sung:

Brother, rest from sin and sorrow
Death is o'er, and life is won;
On thy slumber dawns no morrow;
Rest! thy earthly race is run.

Brother, wake! the night is waning; Endless day is round thee poured; Enter thou the rest remaining For the people of the Lord.

With the tones of early love.
Triumph high and joy unending
Wait thee in the realms above!

The income therefrom may be expended for the use of the Administrative Budget of the Most Excellent Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida. The administrative and investment/reinvestment of this fund shall be under the direction and supervision of the Finance Committee.

NEW LANGUAGE:

There is hereby established a Grand Chapter fund to be designated the Grand Chapter Administrative Endowment Fund of the Most Excellent Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida. Said fund is hereby designated and dedicated as a Sacred Trust Fund, the principal amount whereof shall not be expended for any purpose or purposes whatsoever save for investment and reinvestment. The income therefrom may be expended for the use of the Administrative Budget of the Most Excellent Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida. The administration and investment/reinvestment of this fund shall be under the direction and supervision of the **Investment** Committee.

This amendment shall become effective upon approval.

The above Amendment passed.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE LAWS, RULES, AND REGULATIONS OF THE GRAND CHAPTER OF ROYAL ARCH MASONS OF FLORIDA

Be it hereby resolved that Chapter 12 – Grand Chapter Convocations and Proceedings of the Laws Rules and Regulations of the Grand Chapter Royal Arch Masons be Amended as follows:

Chapter 12.01 Convocations and Proceedings, Presently reads:

The Grand Convocation of this Grand Chapter shall be holden as provided in its Constitution and these Regulations, and its Proceedings recorded and published in accord therewith. All business of the Chapter, with the exception of necessary work by Committees, shall be accomplished on the day of the Grand Convocation.

Chapter 12.01 Convocation and Proceedings be Amended to read as follows:

- (A) The Grand Convocation of this Grand Chapter shall be holden as provided in its Constitution and these Regulations, and its Proceedings recorded and published in accord therewith. All business of the Chapter, with the exception of necessary work by Committees, shall be accomplished on the day of the Grand Convocation.
- (B) The printed proceedings of the preceding Annual Convocation, and any intervening Convocations shall be read for adoption, at the Annual Convocation, unless Motion prevails that the reading be dispensed with and that the proceedings be adopted as printed and distributed.
- (C) All preliminary reports of the Committees of this Grand Chapter

- shall be submitted to the Grand Secretary, no later than thirty (30) days following the conclusion of the Annual Convocation of this Grand Chapter.
- (D) The proceeding of the Annual Convocation shall be printed and distributed too the proper Companions no later than October 1, following the conclusion of the Annual Convocation.

This Amendment shall be effective upon adoption.

The above Amendment passed.

Chapter 24.03 Grand Chapter Approval of Bylaws Presently reads

Proposed bylaws, or amendments thereto, shall be submitted to the Grand High Priest in quadruplicate, all four copies to be signed by the High Priest and the Secretary and under the Seal of the Chapter, giving the dates when such bylaws or amendments were first submitted and approved and adopted by the Chapter. When approved by the Grand High Priest, one copy shall be returned to the Chapter, one filed in the Office of the Grand Secretary, and one retained for the files of the Grand High Priest.

Chapter 24.03 – Grand Chapter Approval of By Laws; be Amended to read as follows:

Proposed bylaws, or amendments thereto, shall be submitted to the Grand High Priest in quadruplicate, all four copies to be signed by the High Priest and the Secretary and under the Seal of the Chapter, giving the dates when such bylaws or amendments were first submitted and approved and adopted by the Chapter. When approved by the Grand High Priest, one copy shall be returned to the Chapter, one filed in the Office of the Grand Secretary, one copy forwarded to the Chairman of the Jurisprudence Committee, and one retained for the files of the Grand High Priest.

This Amendment shall be effective upon adoption.

MINUTES of 125th GRAND ASSEMBLY GRAND COUNCIL, ROYAL & SELECT MASTERS of Florida

Lake Mary, FL May 5, 2005

The St. Petersburg Council No. 14 R. & SM opened in full form, M. I. Companion Donald T Harriott, Most Illustrious Grand Master, Royal and Select Masters of Florida was then received along with the Grand Elected Officers, the Appointed Officers and the District Deputy Grand Masters were introduced. After being conducted to the East and receiving Grand Honors, Donald T. Harriott, MIGM assumed the gavel, ordered the Grand Officers to assume their proper stations and proceeded to call the 125th Grand Assembly to order.

Most Excellent Companion Glenn E. Chandler, Most Excellent Grand High Priest and Sir Knight William G Ellis, Right Eminent Grand Commander were introduced and after public Grand Honors were invited to the East. The M. I. Past Grand Masters of Florida were introduced and given Grand Honors. (See Distinguished Guest report for names).

The Grand Master then asked for the Returns and Credentials report, but it was not ready. While waiting a motion was made and accepted that all Distinguished Guest be given Honorary Memberships. Companion Steven Steele asked why the budget was not available before this; and who was actually at the budget meeting; and how come the Grand Treasurer got a raise and yet the office secretary and Grand Recorder salaries and office expenses where cut, he disapproves this budget. Companion Walter Hammond then spoke on the salary of the secretary would now qualify her for food stamps, he disapproves this budget.
- M. I. Companion Paul Friend the stated that he was not invited or told about the budget meeting even though he is a member of said committee. He also commented that if we can't afford to give \$ 100 to the Masonic Home then we should not be giving \$100 to the Summer Assembly, he disapproves of the budget. Companion Larry Gilliespie asked how they cut utilities for the office to less then he would pay in his own home, M. I. Companion Richard Foreman asked the Budget chairman how much the Per Diem rate is, as that must be considered for the budget. M I Companion James Keaveny stated that he was upset about the cut in the secretary salary, as past Grand Master of Connecticut he feels he has gotten more service from our office then he got when he was

Grand Master and that he doesn't need the per diem and we should give that money to the secretary's salary. Companion James Rudman stated that he also has a problem with this budget, if they are trying to get rid of Chris they are not going about it the right way. M. I. Companion Charles Hollinger then made a motion that this report be referred back to the committee for corrections, the motion was then seconded. Companion Marvin Gerhard said that as a member of this committee that the committee had to control expenses and that the York Rite office should be manned by masons, so that salaries would not matter as much. R. I. Companion Virgil Brown then commented that by cutting Chris's expense account that she would no longer be able to afford the errands, banking, post office and supplies. That she already receives Earned Income Credit due to her low salary. And, that there are several other problems in the office cuts, such as taxes, copier and printing, he feels the budget is totally unreasonable, especially considering that the per capita raise from \$4 to \$8 will be collected this year giving us more funds not less. Grand Master Harriott stated there would only one more comments due to time. Companion Frederick Piasecki said he was tickled with the "coo" that did this budget and that even though many had asked to see said budget before the Grand Assembly they were unable to get it. If you don't like the way things are being done in the office, they should be talked about, not handled this way. The Grand Recorder commented that he could not get a copy of the budget and had not seen it till today. The Grand Master then called for a vote on the acceptance of the budget, it was disapproved. The Grand Master then asked Companion Hollinger remake his motion that the budget be referred to committee and be returned in 1 month. Companion George Malone suggested that the budget be sent to all local officers for their approval and that he would be willing to do the mailing. Companion Harvey Ward said he was distressed that the Grand Office was not consulted about the budget and that this budget needs to be returned today for voting. M. I. Companion Richard Agster stated that if a budget is not voted on today there will be no funds available for use after the end of our fiscal year, which is May 31". Decision made by Grand Master to have the budget committee retire and redo the proposed budget before closing today. Companion Luther Bodiford made a motion that the Per Diem be deleted from the budget making more funds available to the office secretary. M. I. Companion Paul Friend then asked to amend the motion to include Distinguished Guests. Companion Bodiford asked that his motion not be amended and that Companion Friend can make his motion after this one is voted on. The original motion was accepted.

R. I. Companion Duane Young gave the report of the Per Diem committee that the current per diem is \$35. The report was accepted.

Companion Coleman Hill then a commented that we need to raise money from other sources then just our members, such as golfing tournaments or other fundraisers. R.I. Companion Virgil Brown then stated that if we are going to remove the Per Diem permanently we will have to change the Constitution. Companion Bodiford said we would take care of a resolution to do so for next year.

The Grand Master then called for the Jurisprudence committee report which was read by M. I. Companion Daniel Dale. The first part of the report was on the actions of M. I. Grand Master Reuben Owens who passed away in October of 2004 then second part on M. I. Grand Master Donald Harriott's actions. (See

committee reports) The report was accepted as read. M. I. Companion Dale then read the Grand Resolutions for voting. (See Amendments section)

- M. I. Companion Richard Foreman gave the Investment Committee report, it was accepted as read. Companion Foreman then presented Companion Howard Gardner with the first Proficiency Card for Florida. The Grand Master then congratulated Companion Gardner.
- R. P. Companion Bud Himes then presented the Grand Masters Certificate and Pin to M. I. Past Grand Master Stephen Clark, as M. I. Companion Clark was sent to Iraq 1 month before the Grand Assembly last year.

The Grand Master then asked that Companions Richard Foreman and Dencel Smith be presented at the alter. M. I. Companion Foreman received his Grand Representative commission to Maryland and Companion Smith received his commission to Georgia.

The Grand Master then presented to Companions Billy Collier and George T. Collier their Fifty-Year Certificates and Pins. They were then given Grand Honors.

R. I. Companion Louis King then gave the new budget report, Companion David Wilkinson then commented that the new budget still does not have the office secretary salary back to what it was, since we gave up our per diem. Companion Walter Hammond then comment he agreed that the secretary salary be restored and made the motion that the budget be amended to change the secretary's salary. The motion was accepted. Companion Holloway Rollins then commented that the rent in the budget was still not as much as we spent last year. Companion Steven Steele stated that we will look for a cheaper place. Companion Gillespie stated that due to tax purposes we make the Grand Recorders and Grand Treasurers be listed as Allowances expense accounts and not salaries. Companion Steve Steele then commented that the constitution states that the Grand Recorder be salaried not an expense account. Companion Virgil Brown the stated that the copier saves us a lot of time and we have no funds to pay any overtime for the secretary to do what the copier did. The new budget allows the office \$350 to buy a new copier for the office. Companion Darryl Edwards made a comment as to whether the other bodies will follow our budget. Companion Harvey Ward commented that the copier was purchased during his year as Grand High Priest and that we will be going backwards not forward by buying a smaller and less efficient copier. Grand Master asked that there be no more comments and they vote on the motion to accept this budget. The budget was accepted as amended.

Companion Darryl Atkins then gave the report on the CMMRF, and presented some awards for donations, the report was accepted as read. A check from Tyrian Council No. 36 for \$1,000 (funds raised from their Table Council)

The floor was then given to R. P. Companion Bud Himes, of the General Grand Council R & SM then talked on funds to CMMRF and what the foundation is now doing.

Grand Master turned the floor over to M. W. Grand Master Elmer Coffman of the Grand Lodge of Florida, who the talked about the running of the Grand York Rite

who has suffered great losses this year, the Grand Recorder, M. I. Grand Master and the R. E. Grand Commander, plus the Grand York Rite Office. We survived what would have destroyed most companies.

The Grand Master then recessed the Grand Assembly for lunch to reconvene at 1:30 p.m. The Grand Assembly then reconvened.

The Time and Place Committee report was then given.

The Grand Master then presented awards. (See awards section)

Companion Carl Gilmore then gave the Committee on Thanks report, it was accepted as read.

The Elections of Officers was then started. M. I. Companion Richard Agster made a motion that Companion Ralph Vaughan cast the unanimous ballot for Companion Donald T. Harriott, as M. I. Grand Master he accepted, Companion Agster then made a motion that Companion Daniel Dale cast the unanimous ballot for Louis King as Grand Deputy Grand Master, he accepted. Companion King then made a motion that Companion Dale cast the unanimous ballot for Companion George Malone as Grand Principal Conductor of the Work, he accepted through a proxy. Companion Agster then made a motion that Companion Dale cast the unanimous ballot for Companion Duane Young as Grand Treasurer, Companion Steven Steele then nominated Companion Richard Foreman for Grand Treasurer. The Grand Master the appointed companions to serve as tellers for the ballot. Companion Keith Dean then stated that those who hold certain offices and have proxies have 2 votes. The Grand Master asked that all doors be secured during balloting.

While waiting for election results Companion Virgil Brown made an announcement about the "Order of Silver Trowel" will be after the installation of Council officers which will be followed by the "Knights Crusader of the Cross". The Ice Cream Social will be held at 8:00 p.m. and the out-going officers meeting will be at 9:00 p.m. The Order of High Priesthood will follow the installation of officers of the Grand Commandery, tomorrow. Companion Wm. Ronald Taylor commented on the Knight Crusaders of the Cross. Companion William Ellis talked about the planned the 10-day Cruise for November through the Panama Canal, this project will be used to raise money for our Charities.

The results of the ballot were: Companion Young 107 votes, and Companion Foreman 81 votes, R. I. Companion Young was elected and accepted. M. I. Companion Foreman made a motion that the minutes reflect that R. I. Companion Duane Young was elected unanimously, the motion was passed. M. I. Companion Richard Agster made a motion that Companion Steve Steele cast the unanimous ballot for Companion Virgil Brown as Grand Recorder, he accepted.

The Grand Master then talked about the traveling palm tree which needs contributions to make it grow and the funds will then be for our charities.

The Grand Master announced that the District Deputies are to leave their Handbooks and aprons on the seats for the new incoming District Deputies.

The Grand Council then recessed to prepare for the installation of officers for 2005 - 2006.

To the Grand York Rite Bodies of Florida

Subject: Grand Treasurers Preliminary Report

There were three major changes to the usual financial status of the bodies during the 2004-2005 fiscal year. They involved (1) the establishment of Sacred Funds (Bond investment) accounts in the Chapter and the Council, (Commandery had established them earlier) (2) The change of Financial Advisors for the Chapter and Council, and (3) The Hurricane / Owner forced change of Grand Office location - with resultant higher rent.

The BUDGET PERFORMANCE is generally running true to form — The budget for the last few years has exceeded the anticipated income, however frugality on the part of the Grand Officers has limited expenditures so that the difference between income and outgo has been such that no Body (while each dipped into some capital) is in real fiscal trouble. The need for the recent per-capita increase in all three was accented by the fact that it was necessary to withdraw \$5,000 to \$7,000 of investments per body to cover year end expenditures prior to the receipt of the new per-capita.

As to items (1) and (2), the investment committees have had a history of difficulty in reaching a consensus as to how the monies should be invested. Initially, (in 2002) by direction the funds languished in checking accounts for a considerable time until the investment decisions were made. Even then, at last minute the Commandery chose to break with the other two bodies and use a different Investment Advisor. During this past year, it became almost a unanimous view that the Chapter and Council Investment Advisor should be changed. (The previous Advisor was reluctant to respond to our wishes as to investing and also refused to attend Investment Advisors meetings to consider our wishes) After reviewing proposals from several potential Advisors, a lengthy conference call resulted in the choice of The Edward Jones firm as the new Advisor for the Chapter and Council.

Again there was lack of consensus as to the guidelines to be applied to the accounts. After we had closed the previous accounts, the Advisor indicated that he could not provide the income indicated in the conference call without purchasing bonds at a premium in order to achieve the desired yield. The lack of consensus resulting caused one of the talented members of the Investment Committee to resign. Following that resignation, Investment Committee recommendations and subsequent Grand Head instructions were issued not to micromanage the Investment Advisor, but to go along with his advice.

The net result of these actions is that the Administrative, Life and Perpetual Membership and other "Sacred Funds" of the Chapter and Council are securely invested in bonds to provide slightly above the promised 5% yield. The downside is that in order to achieve this, bonds were bought at a premium, and have a current face value of less than the amount invested. The light at the end of that tunnel may be that in some 5-8 years the extra interest will repay the premium and for several years the interest rate will be better. Since a portion of the General Funds is also invested in Bonds, the same type of reduction in the Corpus is evident there.

As to item (3), the combination of Hurricane damage and the desire of the property owner to sell the office facility, prompted the need for a different location. It is understood that the most reasonable facility was located nearby, but at an increase in rental of approximately three times over. This has resulted in the expenditures for rent in each of the budgets to exceed the budgeted amount.

The Commandery Investment Advisor is considered satisfactory and no changes are known to be planned in that area.

Companions, we need to work harder to get new members and to retain those we lost due to NPD.

We had 75 candidates go through the one-day class in Orlando on April 9th. This is more than we exalted all last year. I have heard reports from over the state that the class stirred up some interest in York Rite. We need to take advantage of this by holding District festivals and/or regular (slow) classes in the local bodies.

This past year has been a real eye-opener for me. I had not realized the amount of work needed to run the office, much of it in areas in which I have had no experience.

The three hurricanes that came through Titusville did not help matters much. Hurricane "Charlie" did some hidden damage that led to the severe damage caused by "Jeanne". In preparing for Hurricane "Francis", we placed almost everything in the Office in large heavy plastic bags. This Hurricane brought down most of the ceiling tiles on the second floor of the east side, and all the tiles next to the East wall on the first floor.

After the hurricane, we found two 5 x 10 storage units in Cocoa, and moved the 10 filing cabinets containing the old irreplaceable records and other important records, as well as some of the museum items. All of the Museum was stacked in the back room on our side of the building. Hurricane "Jeanne" ripped a large hole in the roof and brought down all the ceiling tiles on the second floor and the east side of the first floor. Fortunately, we occupied the West side of first floor, and only had some water run down the back wall. Christine and I thank you for the support and sympathy we received from most, though not all, of you.

We have created two new databases this year. One, which will allow us to have a better and continuous view of the statistics of the various Councils; and, will make it easier to calculate the annual returns, provided the local Recorders submit their monthly reports. This database had some flaws (my fault) that did not show up until we tried to use it this year. We have since corrected those flaws.

The other will replace the old membership database; and, will make it easier to

make the various sorts we need to prepare printouts, etc. for the Councils. It will also allow us to keep better track of the Plural memberships; and the service time of our members, provided we are given their exaltation dates. It will take some time to load the date from the old database into it however.

All Recorders are invited to visit the Office to review their records, and help us update them. Please remember that any change in membership numbers must be backed up a report of the individual's membership changes. (i.e., exaltation, transfer, demit, death, etc.)

In May, we had a CPA attempt to set up the Office Account in the Quickbooks accounting system. The system was set up, but was not adequate for our needs. It was more useful for a small profit and loss business. Bob had previously tried to have various people try to set up such a system, none succeeded.

This year we placed the Constitution and Regulations of all three Grand Bodies on a Disc, which can be distributed at a very low cost to the Bodies and our members.

After this Grand York Rite Convention, we plan to have the Constitution and Regulations updated and on discs along with the Proceedings of all three Bodies. While some of our members will still want printed copies, many prefer to have this information on Discs. This should give us considerable savings in printing.

I recommend that we consider going back to the old membership record keeping used prior to the mid 1980's. The Grand York Rite Office did not maintain these records. Each local Recorder maintained his own records, and submitted a complete alphabetic list of his members (names only), and calculated his own annual returns using the forms given him by this Office. This is the method used by most of the states.

I recommend that the budget system be changed, so that the funds to run this Office are carried as one or two line items in the budgets of the three Grand Bodies. And that a comprehensive budget be established with line items that more closely match the various expenditures made by the Office. This would make it easier to write checks against the proper line items; and, would make the Audit easier and more comprehensive.

I further recommend that the cost of the copier be removed from the proceedings line item and be given its own line-item number. This would reflect a more realistic cost of doing the proceedings.

Thank you for letting us serve you this past year.

GRAND COUNCIL COMMITTEE REPORTS AUDIT COMMITTEE

Since the fiscal year for the Grand Council does not end until May 31, 2005, this report is therefore only a preliminary report.

A full audit of the previous fiscal year begun for the late M.I. Ruben Owens and

completed for the present acting Grand Master, Donald T. Harriott was conducted to establish accounting and obtain confidence that the records of the Grand Council were in good order. On February 21, 2005, a review of the Grand Treasurer's records was conducted. With minor adjustments to the account for interest received, disparities between the Grand Treasurer's spreadsheet with regard to check numbers and amounts, it was found that the records reflect the purposes intended by the budget, as reported by the Grand Treasurer and authorized by the presiding officer via proper warrants.

On March 4, 2005 the Grand Recorder's financial records were reviewed during the scheduled audit, along with a cursory review of the Grand Treasurer's records of budgetary transactions and investment summaries for the same period of the previous fiscal year. At a later time, Carl Gilmore conducted an independent partial audit of the Grand York Rite office in general, from materials faxed by the recorders office at his request. It was determined that the Grand Recorder had maintained an extensive complicated spreadsheet to record his journal entries. These records contained inconsistencies and irregular payouts of budgeted items that would typically have been paid on separate warrants via the treasurer. These records failed to meet minimum acceptable accounting practices and additionally vital records had been misplaced or lost. This condition compounded the difficulty in conducting a complete and accurate audit of the Grand Recorder's office. The following points of the audit should be noted:

- The Grand Recorder's records contained errors and omissions markedly obvious beginning in the fall '03 time frame.
- First Quarter employee Federal taxes had not been paid due to the untimely death of the Grand Recorder and the GYR had been fined.
- An independent accountant had been given original financial records from the Grand Recorder's office in an attempt to establish a standardized accounting system.
- Re-boxing of records on multiple occasions during the hurricanes Francis and Jeanne or during the period stated in 3 above, original financial documents were lost or misplaced.
- The office secretary had been over paid beyond budgeted salary; partial repayment had been documented.
- Accountant reported office secretary, as "Contract Labor" to IRS on behalf of the Grand York Rite: IRS refunded penalty.
- Budgeted federal taxes had not been paid on office secretary and part time assistant for the 2004 of calendar year.
- Office secretary had never been compensated for overtime as mandated by state law.
- The current Grand Recorder had paid the part time office assistant a \$1K bonus, due to being classified as "Contract Labor" by the GYR and

subsequently unable to acquire FEMA aid.

- The committee recommends that in view of its present findings for the preceding fiscal year:
- The Grand Master ensure that ONLY the Grand Treasurer be authorized to make payment for budgeted items, via a duly executed warrant for each line item
- DELETED as amended in approved report
- All other bills be directed to be paid by warrant utilizing fax equipment and the established procedure for transmitting warrants by fax dated May 20, 2003 (which may require a non-budgeted purchase of equipment).
- That a ledger of monies received be put in place to be maintained by the Grand Recorder and the Grand Treasurer in order to provide an audit trail of deposited receipts. This ledger should contain record of deposits made on behalf of the Grand Treasurer, borrowed from the named and dated source to cover shortage of funds in the General account. (These advances are the funds temporarily needed to keep the body with a practical balance on hand until per capita or other income sources become available to repay the advances).
- That convention funds collected and not utilized to cover Grand Assembly expenditures are placed back into the Distinguished Guests and Delegates Per Diem budget accounts to show that the budgeted line item spent has been at least partially recovered, instead of the excess monies placed into the General Fund.
- That the budget line item for "Audits" be funded and that an independent Public Accountant be contracted to perform an audit as dictated by Article VI Section 4f and 5c of the Grand Council's Bylaws and Constitutions.
- Only copies of original financial records should be provided to independent accountants or auditors.
- That policy and procedures be established to document the transactions, methods and responsibilities of both the operation of the Grand Recorder's and Treasurer's office.

Several steps have been taken by the current Grand Recorder to ensure that accurate financial records are documented and that no overpayments can occur. These include changing to a ledger style check book method instead of only carbon receipts, with a record of warrant and budget line item documented therein. Additionally, budgeted office support salary deposits are made quarterly to the office account to ensure a timely payroll and to preclude use of "salary advances."

DISTINGUISHED GUESTS REPORT

We, the committee, are pleased to report that the guests of the Grand Council were greeted with appropriate honors

INVESTMENT COMMITTEE

The Investment Committee is tasked under Article VII, Section 7 of the Constitution to make recommendations to the Grand Master and Grand Treasurer in respect to:

- a. Selection of Registered Investment Advisor(s) to manage such funds as entrusted to him, or them, under written contract with the Grand Council,
- b. The terms of contract with the Registered Investment Advisor(s),
- c. The means, methods, and standards for evaluation of the services of the Registered Investment Advisor(s), and
- d. The committee shall comply with the foregoing in respect to the Life Membership Plan, as well as operating funds and funds held in trust by the Grand Council.

At the close of the last fiscal year, the Grand Council had two accounts invested through Steven Powell, Registered Investment Advisor with the firm Morgan/Stanley. The Grand Treasurer's closing report of the fund status showed a two year (actually 26 month) total return on the investments of 10.39% for the General Account and a total return of 1.18% for the Life/Perpetual Account. Additionally, he had been directed to have no more than 60% of the General Account exposed to equity type instruments. In actuality, over 80% of the assets in the General Account were exposed to equity type investments. Too, the average of less than 1% annual return on the sacred assets was totally unacceptable as our regulations stipulate that the Perpetual Memberships were guaranteed 5% annual rate of return.

Based on the foregoing, the Investment Committees of the Grand Council and the Grand Chapter met and determined that we would interview other Registered Investment Advisors. Due to the several hurricanes, etc. the two committees along with the Grand Master, Grand High Priest and the Grand Treasurer arranged for two separate conference calls to hear oral presentations from two other firms. Both calls were very well organized and the committee members were able to ask questions and have instant feedback. After numerous email messages between all concerned, Mr. John E. Sivolella of Edward Jones in Melbourne was selected to be our Registered Investment Advisor. The recommendation was made to the Grand Master.

Upon Executive Orders issued by the Grand Master to the Grand Treasurer, the Morgan/Stanley accounts were closed and two accounts were established with Edward Jones. A "Sacred Funds" Account was established with an investment objective of 5/5% per year return and primarily invested in fixed type instruments. This fund also included the Administrative Endowment monies and the Triennium monies. A total of \$68,361.98 was invested.

A General Account was established to hold the remaining monies to be invested with an investment objective of 60% in equities and 40% in fixed type instruments. The initial account was opened with \$64,237.62.

The Committee would like to thank the Grand Master and Grand Treasurer for taking quick and decisive action in responding to the Committee's recommendation to change investment advisors. The total return on the Grand Council assets was not satisfactory and in the case of the sacred funds, didn't even meet the minimum as required by our regulations.

Further, a monthly accounting of the investment accounts as currently provided by the Grand Treasurer is not a particularly useful tool for the overview of the funds and how they are performing. It is therefore recommended that the Registered Investment Advisor furnish the Committee with no less than a quarterly "Profile Analysis" of the Grand Council's accounts and their performances. It is noted that per the initial "Profile Analysis" provided by Edmond Jones, the "Sacred Funds" Account will yield an average of 6.11%

The Jurisprudence Committee met at 6:30 p.m., 4 May 2005, at the Marriott Hotel in Lake Mary, FL to review the actions taken by M.I. Grand Master Ruben L. Owens. M.I. Owens received and approved four (4) By-laws Amendments and one (1) request for Dispensation. These requests were in compliance with the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Florida and within his authority to approve.

Upon M.I. Owen's death on 27 October 2004, R.I. Donald T. Harriott, R.I. Deputy Grand Master, in accordance with the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Florida became the M.I. Grand Master.

M.I. Harriott received two (2) requests for Dispensations. Both were granted, however, one request had already been approved by M.I. Owens prior to his death. M.I. Harriott received nine (9) requests for By-law changes. He approved eight (8) of those changes and denied one (1). Two (2) of those approved and the one (1) which was denied had been submitted on the same form and as such were not in proper form. The Constituent Council was notified to resubmit their requests on separate forms as required by the Rules and Regulations. The four (4) executive orders and edicts issued by M.I. Harriott were within his power as prescribed by the Rules and Regulations.

The Grand Masters report was reviewed by this committee and approved with the exception of the section titled: Recommendations #1 thru 6.

Pursuant to the Rules and Regulations of the Grand Council, this committee reviewed the proposed Budget for the year 2005/06 but has no authority to make any recommendations on the same.

The proposed Legislation was reviewed and found to have been received in a timely manner and in the proper form. It is recommended by this committee that the proposed changes in Article 6, Reg. 12.06 and Reg. 14.02 be approved.

On behalf of the members of the Jurisprudence Committee we wish to thank Ruben L. Owens, MIPGM and Donald T. Harriott, MIGM for their devotion to the Masonic Fraternity and more especially to the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of Florida.

This savings alone, not counting any other items, more than pays for the copier. During the five years of this lease they have replaced the drum 3 times (expensive item), the lease locks in the maintenance costs so that there is no increase of toners or repairs no matter what goes wrong. We copy at least 120,000 – 180,000 items a year. The above items only cover one event and only a small part of the copying done in the office.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS REPORT

As was the case with last year's report, the Proceedings of the previous Grand Assembly have not been printed and distributed. The Grand Recorder's office though had extenuating circumstances which greatly affected the Proceedings from being printed. In 2004, the state of Florida experienced four devastating hurricanes of which, three of them affected Titusville and the Grand Recorder's office. Additionally, the office had to be moved, as the lease was not renewed which also added to the "down time" experienced by the Grand Recorder's office.

And, as pointed out last year, it has become quite evident that a procedure manual must be developed to govern the operations of the day to day affairs of

the Grand Recorder's office. This was a recommendation approved by the Craft at the 2003 Grand Assembly in Panama City. This is even more important today as the Grand Recorder is also responsible to the Grand Chapter and the Grand Commandery and the requirements of those bodies.

COMMITTEE ON WORK

The Committee on Work was tasked by the Grand Master to review the proposed funeral service as submitted by MPGM Jim Keaveney. Additionally, the Committee on Work would continue to monitor District Instructors and support the issuance of proficiency cards.

The Committee on Work reviewed the proposed funeral service and it is the consensus of the Committee that a Joint Committee be formed representing the three Grand York Rite bodies of Florida to propound a "York Rite" funeral service. Presently, the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar, U.S.A. has an approved funeral service. The General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons International also has an approved funeral service. (This has been submitted as legislation this year in the Grand Chapter for adoption by the Grand Chapter of Florida). But, the General Grand Council of Royal & Select Masters does not presently have a recognized funeral service. There is no "York Rite" funeral service.

Therefore, the Grand Council along with the Grand Chapter & Grand Commandery could be in the forefront by developing a joint York Rite funeral service ritual that would lend itself to the dignity and respect of a departed companion and not be in conflict with the Grand Lodge's last rites.

Report on the District Instructors:

All of the District Instructors were mailed a copy of the approved <u>Policies and Guidelines for District Instructors</u> shortly after their installation. Of the ten instructors, only three held a district school of instruction. And, only five instructors responded to any of the Chairman's communications. These five are to be commended on maintaining a dialog with the Chairman. And R.I Companions Vaughan, Hollinger and Taylor are to be commended on their schools of instruction.

There were no companions reported as having satisfied any of the requirements for a proficiency card.

Companion Howard Gardner was presented with his BLUE proficiency card at this Grand Assembly. As noted on the card, it will be good for three years from the date of issue.

Recommendations on the Ritual:

A number of companions have questioned when the Illustrious Master covers himself. This question has also come up in the schools of instruction. It is

recommended that the Illustrious Master cover himself immediately after giving one rap to seat the companions after the "Pledge of Allegiance to the Flag."

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE GRAND COUNCIL OF ROYAL AND SELECT MASTERS OF FLORIDA

Be it hereby resolved that Article VI – Duties of Grand Officers, Constitution of the Grand Council Royal and Select Masters be Amended as follows:

Article VI - Duties of Grand Officers

Section 1 through 8, as presently adopted

Section 9. (New) - Proceedings, Approval

Prior to printing the proceedings, the Grand Recorder is directed to mail, by certified mail, a draft of the proceedings to the Presiding Grand Master and the Junior Past Grand Master for their review and corrections. If these proceedings have not been return to the Office of the Grand Recorder within fifteen (15) days from the date of mailing, the Grand Recorder shall proceed with printing the proceedings in the original form.

Section 10. (New) – General Grand Council Cryptic Masons International, Triennial Assembly

Triennial Assembly Expenses: The Grand Master, Deputy Grand Master, Grand Principal Conductor of Work, Grand Recorder and all past Grand Masters shall be allowed travel expenses up to four Hundred Dollars (\$400.00) each to attend the Triennial Session of the General Grand Council Cryptic Masons International. Funds for such expenses shall be appropriated by the Budget and Finance Committee each Triennial year from the Special Triennial Assembly Fund and included in the Budget for each Triennial year. No expenses shall be allowed for Wives or family members. Request for reimbursement shall be made by the Companion not later than December 1 of said Triennial year to be honored.

This Amendment shall be effective upon adoption.





MINUTES of the 111th ANNUAL GRAND CONCLAVE GRAND COMMANDERY of FLORIDA

Friday, May 6, 2005 at 8:00 A.M., Brevard Commandery No. 24 opened in full form. The Grand Commandery Officers were introduced and given proper honors, and then assumed their proper stations. After receiving Grand Honors, Sir Knight William G. Ellis, Right Eminent Grand Commander reconvened the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Florida for its 111th Annual Grand Conclave at the Lake Mary Marriott in Orlando, Florida.

The Grand Prelate, Sir Knight Robert L. Blackwell, offered prayer, which was followed by the pledge of Allegiance to our Flag. Most Excellent Companion Glenn E. Chandler, Most Excellent Grand High Priest and Most Illustrious Companion Donald T. Harriott, Most Illustrious Grand Master of Florida were introduced and after public Grand Honors were invited to the East. The Right Eminent Past Grand Commanders of Florida were introduced and given Grand Honors. (See Distinguished Guest report for names).

The Grand Commander requested the preliminary report of the Returns and Credentials committee. Sir Knight Frank Buell reported that all Commanderies are present. The report was seconded and adopted. The Grand Commander then asked the Grand Recorder to call the roll. Sir Knight Duane Young then gave the report of the Per Diem Committee. The Grand Commander then asked for the minutes of the 110th Grand Conclave to be read. The Grand Recorder moved that they be accepted as written and distributed. The motion was seconded and adopted. The Grand Recorder requested that all committee reports that were written and distributed be accepted as written and published. The motion was seconded and adopted. The Grand Commander, William G. Ellis, then gave his report, and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried.

Sir Knight William Ronald Taylor gave the Jurisprudence Committee Report and moved its adoption. The motion was seconded and carried. The Grand Recorded then commented that we have changed the time frame we use to develop statistics for awards to match the Constitution and Grand Encampment requirements,

Sir Knight Robert Burleson spoke about the Richard J, Carr Award. The Trophy for this award was bought by Olivet Commandery #4 and presented to the Grand Commandery for presentation to the winners of the award.

The Grand Recorder read the list of those proposed for Emeritus status. Sir Knight David Aponte of Ocala No. 19 said he had sent in 3 names that were not read. Sir Knight Keith Dean of Tampa Ivanhoe No. 8 also said he had 2 names, and there were also some names from Pilgrim Commandery No. 7 and Oriental No. 9. All those proposed for Emeritus status were approved.

The Grand Commander then called for the Audit Committee report. Sir Knight Carl Gilmore gave the report. The Grand Recorder commented that way the budget is set up doesn't match the accounts/bills and that was the reason that the Office Account was established to keep us from paying late charges while waiting for checks from the Grand Treasurer. Many of these items are being worked. Sir Knight Walter Hammond stated that the Audit Committee is trying to Micro manage the office and that the part of the report stating that all individual bills be paid by individual warrants, not quarterly as it is presently is not a good idea because it does cause delays and more work. He said that if we did it that way in Jacksonville York Rite we would be paying bills late. It should be removed from the report suggestions. Sir Knight Fred Piasecki said that many times before the office account was instituted, the payroll checks were often late and that Sir Knight Robert Young, the Grand Recorder would use the office account to help pay the office secretary's rent on time. Sir Knight Richard Foreman made comments on having a petty cash system to pay office bills. Sir Knight Richard Wolfe stated, as a member of the Audit Committee, that with the current electronic systems there is no need to use the mail for warrants to be sent back and forth. Sir Knight Harvey Ward observed that in previous years the Grand Officers and the Grand Office did work smoothly and the problems are from the change over and ill health of the last Grand Recorder and that was to be expected. We have a competent Grand Recorder and Office staff and we have no thieves in that office and the Grand bodies allow the Grand Recorder and the Grand Treasurer to work out this with each other. Sir Knight Richard Agster, Judge Advocate General stated that the Constitution doe not allow the office to have a checking account and that if we are to continue the system we need to change our Constitution. The Grand Treasurer suggested that the office have \$1000.00 in an account to take care of unexpected items or emergencies. The Grand Commander said that the 3 Grand Officers would be working with the office and the Grand Treasurer on these matters.

Sir Knight Marvin Gerhard gave the report of the Budget Committee. It was revised to match the revised Grand Council budget except for those items peculiar to the Commandery. The Grand Recorder stated that the budget still does not include the office secretary's expense account to pay for her running errands for the office and that by placing the Grand Treasurer and Grand Recorder accounts as salary instead of expense accounts will cause the FICA and Unemployment taxes to go up. Sir Knight Richard Foreman stated that this is not a budget by an expense sheet. A Budget should also list the income as well as expenses. Sir Knight Gerhard stated what the income is and the final report will have the funds listed. Sir Knight Harvey Ward then asked if we are still going to put the legislation through that removed the Per Diem and that the office be given the proper equipment to do their job properly. The Grand Commander said that he and the other two Grand presiding officers will get a copier that suits the needs of the office. Sir Knight Fred Piasecki said the budget should give actual costs versus budget amount. Sir Knight Gerhard said that with the budget not ending for one more month that that is not possible. The Grand Commander then called for a vote on the motion to accept the budget. It moved, seconded, and

Sir Knight Luther Bodiford made a motion that Per Diem be removed for 2006 in order to help the budget and to be consistent with the Grand Council. The motion was seconded and passed.

The Grand Commander then presented the Beauceant Award to Ocala No. 19.

Sir Knight Guy Waltman, Inspector General gave his report and awarded the Jessie R. Ramsdell Trophy to Damascus Commandery No. 2 and the Sir Francis Drake Award to Tampa Ivanhoe No. 8.

Sir Knight Edward Bush gave the report of the Committee on Work and moved its adoption. It was seconded and adopted as read.

The Grand Commander then presented a Grand Representatives commission to Sir Knight Charles Cicero for Portugal. He presented a Fifty-Year Service Award to Sir Knight George T. Collier.

The Grand Commander introduced Sir Knight Henry Adams, his Chief of Staff and thanked him for his assistance during the year.

Sir Knight Duane Young gave a report of the Investment Committee because the chairman was not available and moved the adoption of the report. It was seconded and passed.

Sir Knight Richard Sealy, Right Eminent Grand Commander of South Carolina spoke for the distinguished guests and thanked us for our hospitality and kindness.

The Grand Commander then asked the Chief of Staff to present the representatives of Springtime Commandery No. 40 and Melbourne Commandery No. 41 to the west of the altar and presented them with Plaques for the highest percentage of gain in membership.

The Grand Commander then asked that Damascus Commandery No. 2 representatives present to assemble west of the altar to receive the Plaque for the Greatest Number of Knightings.

The Grand Commander asked for any other committee reports. Sir Knight Wm. Ronald Taylor gave the report of the Constitution Committee. There were three pieces of legislation proposed. Two should be withdrawn due to Grand Encampment rules. The third was unnecessary as it is just a change in wording. Sir Knight James Rudman removed his resolution.

The Grand Recorder announced that the packages for Secretary/Recorders are in the office and to please pick them up.

Sir Knight Fred Morris gave the Unfinished Business report. There was none. He moved the adoption of the report. It was seconded and passed.

Sir Knight Ken Scott, Commander of Tampa Ivanhoe No. 8 presented a check for \$1,535.47 for the Knight Templar Eye Foundation, with \$80.00 earmarked for education.

Sir Knight Donald Harriott gave the Time and Place Committee report. The convention in 2006 will be on April 30 through May 3rd at the Holiday Inn Resort in Cocoa Beach, FL. and moved the adoption of the report. It was seconded and passed.

The Grand Recorder asked the Grand Commander and the Grand Master to please give him copies of their reports.

Sir Knight Richard Foreman commented on the Ladies Basket Auction and that we need to support them since this money will be given to our charities.

Sir Knight Walter Hammond gave a report on York University and moved the adoption of the report. It was seconded and passed as read. He requested that all who wish to attend the next session of the University to please let him know for planning purposes.

The Grand Commander asked that if your Commandery or District is holding festival or conferring degrees to please let him and the office know as many people contact him and the office to send candidates to these functions.

The Grand Commander presented the Meritorious Service Medals.

Sir Knight Frank Clawson gave the final report of the Returns and Credentials committee, and moved its adoption as read. It was seconded and adopted.

The Grand Recorder announced that the hotel was having lunch specials for all that wished to eat here.

The Grand Commander called for election of Officers for the coming year. Sir Knight Marvin Gerhard made the motion that Sir Knight Wm. Ronald Taylor cast a unanimous ballot for Sir Knight William G. REPORT OF THE GRAND COMMANDER FOR 2004-2005

WELCOME

It is with a heavy heart that I have to write this report. However, it was the Lord's will that our Grand Commander William R. McKee was called to be with his Savior and his wife on December 13, 2004. As Deputy Grand Commander, it became my duty to succeed him as Grand Commander. My thanks to each of you for making the transition as easy as it possibly could be under the circumstances. With that said, I welcome each of you to the 111th Annual Conclave of the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Florida. I am honored that you have chosen to be here and grace us with your presence. It is a distinct pleasure for me to greet our distinguished visitor from our Grand Encampment Southeastern Department, and the other grand jurisdictions.

I hope you are enjoying your accommodations, the greater Central Florida area and the fun, food, and fellowship of this session of the Grand York Rite of Florida.

THE WORLD VIEW

The United States has found itself with its few allies involved in a battle for freedom in Southwest Asia. To the Grand York Rite Bodies of Florida

Subject: Grand Treasurers Preliminary Report

There were three major changes to the usual financial status of the bodies during the 2004-2005 fiscal year. They involved (1) the establishment of Sacred Funds (Bond investment) accounts in the Chapter and the Council. (Commandery had established them earlier) (2) The change of Financial Advisors for the Chapter and Council, and (3) The Hurricane / Owner forced change of Grand Office location - with resultant higher rent.

The BUDGET PERFORMANCE is generally running true to form -- The budget for the last few years has exceeded the anticipated income, however frugality on the part of the Grand Officers has limited expenditures so that the difference between income and outgo has been such that no Body (while each dipped into some capital) is in real fiscal trouble. The need for the recent per-capital increase in all three was accented by the fact that it was necessary to withdraw \$5,000 to \$7,000 of investments per body to cover year end expenditures prior to the receipt of the new per-capita.

As to items (1) and (2), the investment committees have had a history of difficulty in reaching a consensus as to how the monies should be invested. Initially, (in 2002) by direction the funds languished in checking accounts for a considerable time until the investment decisions were made. Even then, at last minute the Commandery chose to break with the other two bodies and use a different Investment Advisor. During this past year, it became almost a unanimous view that the Chapter and Council Investment Advisor should be changed. (The previous Advisor was reluctant to respond to our wishes as to investing and also refused to attend Investment Advisors meetings to consider our wishes) After reviewing proposals from several potential Advisors, a lengthy conference call resulted in the choice of The Edward Jones firm as the new Advisor for the Chapter and Council.

Again there was lack of consensus as to the guidelines to be applied to the accounts. After we had closed the previous accounts, the Advisor indicated that he could not provide the income indicated in the conference call without purchasing bonds at a premium in order to achieve the desired yield. The lack of consensus resulting caused one of the talented members of the Investment Committee to resign. Following that resignation, Investment Committee recommendations and subsequent Grand Head instructions were issued not to micromanage the Investment Advisor, but to go along with his advice

The net result of these actions is that the Administrative, Life and Perpetual Membership and other "Sacred Funds" of the Chapter and Council are securely invested in bonds to provide slightly above the promised 5% yield. The downside is that in order to achieve this, bonds were bought at a premium, and have a current face value of less than the amount invested. The light at the end of that tunnel may be that in some 5-8 years the extra interest will repay the premium and for several years the interest rate will be better. Since a portion of the General Funds is also invested in Bonds, the same type of reduction in the Corpus is evident there.

As to item (3), the combination of Hurricane damage and the desire of the property owner to sell the office facility, prompted the need for a different location. It is understood that the most reasonable facility was located nearby, but at an increase in rental of approximately three times over. This has resulted in the expenditures for rent in each of the budgets to exceed the budgeted amount.

The Commandery Investment Advisor is considered satisfactory and no changes are known to be planned in that area. Duane B. Maury

Companions, we need to work harder to get new members and to retain those we lost due to NPD.

We had 75 candidates go through the one-day class in Orlando on April 9th. This is more than we exalted all last year. I have heard reports from over the state that the class stirred up some interest in York Rite. We need to take advantage of this by holding District festivals and/or regular (slow) classes in the local bodies.

This past year has been a real eye-opener for me. I had not realized the amount of work needed to run the office, much of it in areas in which I have had no experience.

The three hurricanes that came through Titusville did not help matters much. Hurricane "Charlie" did some hidden damage that led to the severe damage caused by "Jeanne". In preparing for Hurricane "Francis", we placed almost everything in the Office in large heavy plastic bags. This Hurricane brought down most of the ceiling tiles on the second floor of the east side, and all the tiles next to the East wall on the first floor.

After the hurricane, we found two 5×10 storage units in Cocoa, and moved the 10 filing cabinets containing the old irreplaceable records and other important records, as well as some of the museum items. All of the Museum was stacked in the back room on our side of the building. Hurricane "Jeanne" ripped a large hole in the roof and brought down all the ceiling tiles on the second floor and the east side of the first floor. Fortunately, we occupied the West side of first floor, and only had some water run down the back wall.

Christine and I thank you for the support and sympathy we received from most, though not all, of you.

We have created two new databases this year. One, which will allow us to have a better and continuous view of the statistics of the various Commanderies; and, will make it easier to calculate the annual returns, provided the local Recorders submit their monthly reports. This database had some flaws (my fault) that did not show up until we tried to use it this year. We have since corrected those flaws.

The other will replace the old membership database; and, will make it easier to make the various sorts we need to prepare printouts, etc. for the Commanderies. It will also allow us to keep better track of the Plural memberships; and the service time of our members, provided we are given their exaltation dates. It will take some time to load the date from the old database into it however.

All local Recorders are invited to visit the Office to review their records, and help us update them. Please remember that any change in membership numbers must be backed up a report of the individual's membership changes. (i.e., exaltation, transfer, demit, death, etc.)

In May, we had a CPA attempt to set up the Office Account in the Quickbooks accounting system. The system was set up, but was not adequate for our needs. It was more useful for a small profit and loss business. Bob had previously tried to have various people try to set up such a system, none succeeded.

This year we placed the Constitution and Regulations of all three Grand Bodies on a Disc, which can be distributed at a very low cost to the Bodies and our members.

After this Grand York Rite Convention, we plan to have the Constitution and Regulations updated and on discs along with the Proceedings of all three Bodies. While some of our members will still want printed copies, many prefer to have this information on Discs. This should give us considerable savings in printing.

I recommend that we consider going back to the old membership record keeping used prior to the mid 1980's. The Grand York Rite Office did not maintain these records. Each local secretary/recorder maintained his own records, and submitted a complete alphabetic list of his members (names only), and calculated his own annual returns using the forms given him by this Office. This is the method used by most states.

I recommend that the budget system be changed, so that the funds to run this Office are carried as one or two line items in the budgets of the three Grand Bodies. And that a comprehensive budget be established with line items that more closely match the various expenditures made by the Office. This would make it easier to write checks against the proper line items; and, would make the Audit easier and more comprehensive.

I further recommend that the cost of the copier be removed from the proceedings line item and be given its own line-item number. This would reflect a more realistic cost of doing the proceedings.

Thank you for letting us serve you this past year.

INSPECTOR GENERAL'S REPORT

To the Grand Commandery of Knights Templar of Florida:

During the Chivalric Year A.D. 2004-2005, A.O. 886-887, only one Commandery of the Grand Jurisdiction of Florida competed for the Jesse E. Ramsdell Trophy. Upon arrival, I was received very well. Inspection revealed that this Commandery had spent considerable time in practicing and perfecting their performance. They displayed a very positive attitude and a great amount of enthusiasm in their performance. This type of attitude and spirit should be the desire and goal of each Knight Templar in this Grand Jurisdiction when performing our very beautiful full form opening and the ceremony of the Order of the Temple.

It was very evident that this Commandery followed the suggestions and comments I made in the letter I sent last September, together with the comments following each section of the inspection the year before. This demonstrates that the new procedure introduced two years ago of telling each competitor exactly what errors were detected in their inspection, so that they might spend time in correcting and perfecting their work, resulted in a much higher score at their next inspection.

The winner of the competition is Damascus Commandery No. 2, Knights Templar, with a score of 96.4 out of a possible 100, and would have been even higher if their Prelate had not been absent. A full point is lost for each officer who is not present, no matter what the reason. Another deduction is made if the Prelate appears dressed in Prelate's robes rather than full dress uniform without sword.

I want to express my disappointment that only one Commandery competed this year. I know that there are other Commanderies who perform the full form opening at most of their meetings, and who are able to perform the Order of the Temple quite well. In the interest of improving our floor work and ritual performance, I strongly urge all Commanderies in Florida to enter the competition, and to create a high degree of competition in Florida to do excellent work.

I wish to thank the Sir Knights of Damascus Commandery No. 2, and their Commander, E.S.K. David A. Yarborough, for the fellowship and the courtesies extended to me, and I wish them continued success in the future. I also wish to thank the Right Eminent Grand Commander, William R. McKee, for appointing me Inspector General and for permitting me to serve Chivalric Masonry in this capacity during the past Chivalric Year. He will be most sorely missed in the future.

GRAND COMMANDERY COMMITTEE REPORTS

AUDIT COMMITTEE

Subj. Audit Committee Report for Fiscal Year 2003-04 and Partial 2004-05

THE GRAND COMMANDERY OF KNIGHTS TEMPLAR OF MAY 6, 2005

The below signed members of the Audit Committee, appointed by REGC William Ellis, have completed an audit of the financial records of Grand Treasurer and Grand Recorder and submit the following summary report for the period June 2003 through March 04 and partial year 2004-05.

It had been our hope to organize a common audit day, for those on the several audit committees to share conclusions and recommendations. We all met at the Grand Recorder's office on Friday March 4, 2005. However, the audit process, conclusions and recommendations of the various audit committees have thus far not been shared or consolidated.

This report is separated into a Treasurer's and a Recorder's section.

<u>Audit process:</u> Data was retrieved from the Grand York Rite Office and input into an electronic, small business style, accounting system, Peach Tree, which was used to analyze the data. This information was shared by email with the other committee members. Notes taken and records reviewed during our visit to the Grand Office March 4th were also taken into consideration.

<u>Treasurer</u> The audit chairman independently reviewed the treasurer's books and found they balanced.

Findings:

- Not all checks are written by the Grand Treasurer.
- Usually only one fund dispensing warrant is issued by the 3 principal officers (Chapter, Council and Commandery) as needed every 3 months or so to the Grand Office.

Recommendation:

- All checks written by the Grand Office should be written by the Grand
- A 100% warrant process should be implemented requiring the 3 principal Grand Officer's signatures for the dispensing of funds for common purposes.

Recorder The audit chairman independently input the data retrieved from the Grand Recorders Office into his Business Style Software Accounting System (Peachtree) and shared those finding with the committee.

Findings:

- Audits are not always completed in a timely manner.
- There is no documented budget for the operation of the Grand Recorder's Office.
- There is no approved documented system of bookkeeping or

- accounting, either manual or computer for the Office.
- The office checking account document audit trail is incomplete. Current checking practices do not provide return of cancelled checks.
- The filing of bills and claims after payment is not consistent with the Grand Body's budget items. While this may well be considered as part of the bookkeeping system, it is noted separately since it refers to filing rather than accounting.

Recommendations:

- Audits should be conducted, completed and printed annually.
- The Grand Recorder's Office should have a budget consistent with that approved at the annual Grand Convention.
- An electronic bookkeeping system that includes an accounting checks and balance system, including computerized checking should be purchased and implemented for the Grand Recorder's Office, (i.e. Peachtree, Quicken).
- A policy and procedures manual for the Grand Recorder's Office should be developed and maintained. This document should be mandatory reading for all incoming principal officers,
- The issuing of quarterly warrants to the Grand Recorder's Office should cease. The office should operate on a warrant system, either electronic or manual, requiring the signatures of all three bodies' Principal Officers before any funds for common purposes are dispensed.
- Terminate the lease for the copier.
- The present office building lease rate is not within budget. Different arrangements should be made to bring this within budget constraints.

Observation:

This committee observed that the three principal Grand Officers (Chapter, Council and Commandery) are responsible \underline{FOR} the Grand Office NOT \underline{to} the Grand Office. This is sometimes misunderstood, but should remain a hard rule.

This committee would like to thank the Grand Commander for the opportunity to serve the craft.

HISTORY COMMITTEE 2005

Last year your committee stated "nothing remains constant", and we were correct We informed you that the Clearwater York Rite Masonic Temple at Clearwater was sold. The Clearwater York Rite Bodies are now meeting at Dunedin Lodge number 192, Dunedin, Florida. The former Clearwater York Rite Temple has been completely remodeled and divided into several office type rooms. The exterior also has been remodeled with new landscaping. Supposedly the building has 26 separate lines into the building where they can handle multiple calls. It. is now a mail order pharmaceutical building. We also informed you that Winter Haven Commandery merged with Lakeland number 21. This year we can repeat the old saying "nothing remains constant. We will now explain why.

In the 1950's the members of the Miami York Rite bodies were confronted with a problem .The problem, they had out grown their existing facility. They needed to relocate. They also had to find a desirable piece of property, where they could acquire enough land to build a building to accommodate them for years to come. They selected a piece of property on the Miami River large enough to accommodate their plans. They purchased it and then constructed a beautiful

multi floor building. A real Masonic Temple. The asylum was huge. They could seat over 300 comfortably. They thought "we won't outgrow this building", "we won't have to move again". It appeared the York Rite Bodies of Miami were set for life. The Miami Bodies worked hard paying for the temple. Finally it belonged to them. They were so proud. During the fifties, sixties, and seventies, membership grew. The dynamic leaders of yesterday passed from view. New leaders emerged, and guided the Miami York Rite forward.

In the nineteen eighties a new trend began. Many organizations, including Masonry, began to see a decline in membership .The Miami York Rite bodies were not any different. New members could not offset the rate of attrition. Their membership continued its decline. They had seen the pinnacle. The maintenance on the building was getting expensive, with only a handful of the members able to do the work of maintaining the building. It was getting harder and harder to keep it in pristine condition. Times certainly had changed. Miami had also changed .lt had kept growing, and growing. Available land was now almost non existent. Situated on the Miami River the Miami York Rite Temple became prime real estate. In 2004 they received several bonafide offers. After months of debate, and considerable discussion by the members it was decided now was the proper time to sell their beloved Temple. Another piece of Masonic history was fading from view. Finally the Miami York Rite Temple was sold. The York Rite bodies moved. They are now meeting at the Hialeah Opa-Locka Masonic Temple, located at 150 W. 20th Street, Hialeah, Florida. Their mailing address is P.O. Box 970470 Miami, Florida.

Another important bit of history has taken place in the York Rite .We now travel from Miami. to Live Oak. Years ago the Live Oak York Rite Bodies were one of the most progressive bodies in all of Florida. They erected a beautiful brick multi floor building complete with York Rite symbols carved into the archway above the entrance. Like Miami these masons were really proud of their temple Years passed. Outstanding masons were prevalent. Live Oak produced several Past Grand Masters, and grand officers. Then a major fire destroyed the top two floors. Even with this severe loss they overcame adversity. They renovated the first floor, and continued to meet in this historic building. Time kept marching on. Leaders died, others moved away, transition became a way of life. Today the members of Live Oak are still viable, but they are now meeting in Tallahassee. We wish the Live Oak and Miami bodies they very best in their new facilities.

NECROLOGY REPORT

Preface

This memorial service is most unusual because Rueben L Owens the Most Illustrious Grand Master of the Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters and William Richard McKee the Right Eminent Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Florida died while in office. This is a singular occurrence and hopefully one, which will not be repeated. We remember with respect and with thanks to God these two leaders of the York Rite in the annual necrology report.

Memorial Minute for William Richard McKee Right Eminent Grand Commander of Knights Templar of Florida, 2004

William R. McKee was born on February 10, 1927 in West Virginia and educated there. He served in the U. S. Navy, received a college degree in Ohio, and moved to Florida in 1963. He was raised to the sublime degree of Master Mason in Aurora Lodge #48 in Ohio on 23 November 1957.

He served as Worship Master of Nitram Lodge #188, St. Petersburg in 1980, the year when the ground-breaking ceremony and dedication of that lodge occurred. He became a member of the Scottish Rite on April 23,1960, was nominated and made a 33° degree mason of the Scottish Rite, and became a member of the Shrine in 1976. He entered York Rite of Masonry on June 28, 1980 In St. Petersburg.

He has a distinguished record as a York Rite mason. His achievements include serving as High Priest of Royal Arch Chapter #31 in 1986, Illustrious Master of Royal and Select Masters in Council #14 in 1988, and Eminent Commander of Sunshine Commandery #20 on December 16, 1988. He received the Knight Commander of the Court of Honor in 1988, and in 1990, the Knights of York Cross of Honor. The Red Cross of Constantine was added in 1994, and he was governor of the York Rite College in 1999 and was selected for the Purple Cross of the York Rite College.

Sir Knight William P. McKee entered the Grand line of Knights Templar as Eminent Prelate in 1995 and advanced through the ranks until he was inducted as Right Eminent Grand Commander in 2004.

Sir Knight Bill's health began to fail as he worked his way to the rank of Grand Commander. When he stepped into the office as Commander many wondered if he would survive the year. Grand Commander Bill felt this most of all. No one understood better than he just how poor his health was, how shallow was his breath, how it limited him.

It was while coping with his overwhelming odds that he showed us an outstanding example of fidelity and a wonderful lesson. -John Short a minister of the United Church in Canada once said, The greatest of all deeds is a life well lived. William R. McKee exemplified this saying because he stayed the course in spite of his debilitating illness. Can you imagine anything better to do in the circumstances he endured? Can you think of anything you could desire more if you were to find yourself in a similar circumstance? How would you handle the worse ordeal of your life?

In addition to giving us a sterling example of faith and fortitude to follow, this Grand Commander has taught us an important lesson. When life got unbearable, got prepared. Robert Young, our deceased beloved Grand Secretary/Recorder, visited Bill a month or so before his induction as Grand Commander. Bill had just returned home from hospital and Bob was worried about the ensuing term of the Grand Commandery. Bob expected to find plenty of loose ends. Instead what he found was readiness. Bill had his appointments made, his letters written, his plans laid-out. The Templar year was in healthy state even if he wasn't and he wasn't. Our worse fears came to pass and William Richard McKee, Right Eminent Grand Commander of Knights Templar of Florida, died in December mid-way through his term, but the work continued because of his preparations. Our present Grand Commander Sir Knight William G. Ellis took the preparations Sir Knight Bill made and has guided us well by building on them. Would you painstakingly, while in pain, make such preparations? Let this be a lesson for you. There are those who count on you as long as you have the breath of life. Whether you are in sickness or in health, there are those who need your guidance and care. Don't forget it. Right Eminent Grand Commander William R. McKee didn't.

After the acts of remembrance and before the prayer of the people:

In Winchester Virginia there is a cemetery which is the final resting-place of many who died while fighting in the Civil War. They are buried in a common grave, unnamed, which is identified by a single gravestone, which reads: Who they were no one knows; What they were everyone knows. Today, we make this claim for our honored dead. The ages might not know who they are, but what they stood for as Sir Knights will be known forever.

It has been suggested that the more of the printing be done by sub-contractors, to give you idea of what the cost difference is I'm giving you the figures from both:

This savings alone, not counting any other items, more than pays for the copier. These items before this copier would take a week with volunteers collating and stabling the items, which the copier does automatically. So it not only saves money it saves time. The current contract for the copier is up in June and we should considered getting a newer model, under the lease plan. During the five years of this least they have replaced the drum 3 times (expensive item), the lease locks in the maintenance cost so that there is no increase in cost of toners or repairs no matter what goes wrong. We copy at least 120,000 -180,000 items a year. The above items only cover one event and only a small part of the copying done in the office.

- The full dress black uniform with a white Naval Officer style cap (same as worn with the approved summer uniform), sword & belt and gloves.
- 3. The cap and mantle.
- 4. The Summer Uniform

All have been approved for wear all year with the provision that each constituant Commandery will wear the same uniform (no mixing of uniforms in a constituant commandery). Each constituant Commandery will vote and decide which of the approved uniforms they will wear and for what occasions.

37.302. Dress Uniforms (renumbered from 37.301) no change. 37.303. Dress Uniform with Chapeau; Specifications. (renumbered from 37.302) no change.

Added. 37.304. Dress Uniforms with White Summer Uniform Hat; Specifications. Subparagraphs a) and b) no change. Subparagraph c) White Hat. In lieu of the Chapeau, a Military Naval Dress Cap of the following description. For Past Grand Commanders: Military Naval Dress Cap with white top, black band, and black visor with one row of gold oak leaves and acorns, metal purple Templar Cross 2 and ½ inches square, fixed to the front of the black band and a gold chin strap attached with gold chin strap attached with gold buttons. For Grand Commander: Same as above except red Templar Cross. For Grand Commandery Officers: Same as above except plain black visor. For Commanders and Past Commanders: Same as above except plain black visor. For Commanders and Past Commanders: Same as above except with a 1 and 3/8-inch by 2-inch red metal Passion Cross trimmed in gold with rays. For all other Sir Knights: Same as above except using a red metal passion cross trimmed in silver and a silver chin strap attached with silver buttons. Subparagraphs d), e), f), g), h), i), and j) no change.

Added, 37,305, Cap and Mantle, Specifications, a) TEMPLAR MANTLE: In general, the mantie shall be of the style worn by medieval Tempiars and by members of the sovereign Great Priories. It shall consist of white material, with hood, reaching to approximately twelve inches from the floor and ornamented as follows: 1. For members of the Order below the rank of Commander: The mantle shall be of white; the hood to be lined with silky white material; the Passion Cross in bright red, nine inches in height, on the left breast; the mantle to tie closely around the neck with white cords with white tassels. 2. For commanders and Past Commanders: The mantle shall have a single red ribbon one inch wide, stitched one-half inch from the outer edge; the hood to be lined with a similar red material; the Passion Cross in red with gold rays, nine inches in height, on the left breast; the mantle to tie closely around the neck with red cords with red tassels. 3. For Grand Officers and Past Grand Officers entitled to permanent rank; The mantle shall have the ribbon on a Past Commander and an additional red ribbon one-half inch wide, stitched one-half inch from said ribbon; the Templar Cross in red, nine inches in height on the left breast; the mantle to tie closely around the neck with red cords and red tassels. 4. For the Grand Commander: The mantle shall have a single red ribbon, two inches wide, stitched one inch from the outer edge; the hood lined in red with a similar material; the Templar Cross in red, nine inches in height on the left breast; the mantle to tie closely around the neck with red cords and red tassels. 5. For Past Grand Commanders: The mantle shall have a single purple ribbon, one and one-half inches wide. stitched three-quarters of an inch from the outer edge; the hood lined in purple with similar material; and the Templar Cross in Purple material on the left breast, nine inches in height; the mantle to tie closely around the neck with purple cords and red tassles. b) TEMPLAR CAP: The Templar cap shall follow the design and specifications of the style worn by the Sovereign Great Priories, three inches in depth and very slightly flared at the top. 1. For all members of the Order below the rank of Past Grand Commander: The cap shall be of bright red velvet (or silk) and the cross displayed on the front of the


