

November 28, 1950 fees for degrees at Monroe D. Cushing Chapter 54, R.A.M., raised from \$21.00 to \$30.00.

December 20, 1950 raising the dues of Poinciana Chapter 50 at Fort Myers from \$2.00 to \$3.00 a year.

During the fiscal year, your High Priest executed vouchers No. 1 through No. 43, amounting to \$4,029.94. All vouchers and records are in the hands of the Finance Committee and are available for your inspection.
