

Royal and Select Masters—


Add 1000 years to the common era. Thus: 1962 and 1000—2962.

REPORT OF THE M. E. GRAND HIGH PRIEST

(Which was adopted)

To the Most Excellent Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida:

Companions. I greet you on this the One Hundred and Fifteenth Annual Convocation of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of the State of Florida.

To our many distinguished guests and visitors from other Grand Jurisdictions, who are honoring us by their presence here today. I extend a most cordial welcome, in behalf of the Grand Chapter of Florida. We trust that your visit will be most pleasant, and we hope that we, in our humble way, may provide a stimulus for our beloved Fraternity.

It is indeed gratifying to see so many of our own Companions in attendance this morning. Most of you I have met in my travels about the state, and it is my earnest prayer that the deliberations of this Annual Grand Convocation will furnish you inspiration, and that you will return to your respective Chapters with renewed zeal in the promotion of York Rite Masonry. Companions, this is your Grand Chapter and you are expected to take part in its discussions.

Companions, it was just a year ago, in Fort Myers, that you bestowed upon me the highest honor within your power; and that I stood before our Holy Altar, in the presence of the Grand High Priest of Heaven and Earth, and promised to perform all the duties of that office to the best of my ability. Also, we were saddened by the death of many other Companions.

A suitable Memorial Service in honor of our departed Companions will be held later by the Committee on Memorials.

FINANCIAL VOUCHERS

During the past year the Presiding Officers of the Grand York Rite Bodies have worked together in perfect harmony. It was indeed a pleasure to serve with Sir Knight James William Carter. Right Eminent Grand Commander and Companion Paul Richard Davis, Most Illustrious Grand Master. Jim and Paul, may we all live and serve York Rite for many years to come.

STATE OF THE ORDER

Companions, the past year, 1961, was the first year since 1942 that your Grand Chapter has failed to show a gain in membership. Our net loss was 28 Companions. Suspensions for non-payment of dues were responsible for our failure to show a gain. Companions, our suspensions for non-payment of dues increased thirty-four percent in 1961 over 1960. Later, I will make a suggestion that I believe will reduce these suspensions.

In 1960 sixteen Chapters showed a loss. The number of Chapters showing a loss in 1961 increased to twenty-one. But, Companions, they were not all the same Chapters. Some Chapters showing a loss in 1960, showed gains in 1961; also, Chapters showing gains in 1960 showed losses in 1961.

A few statistics relative to the Subordinate Chapters might prove in-A few statistics relative to the Subordinate Chapters might prove interesting. Eleven Chapters that showed gains in 1960, had a loss in 1961. Four Chapters had a greater loss in 1961 than in 1960. Five Chapters had a smaller loss in 1961 than in 1960. But, Companions, there are some encouraging returns. Nine Chapters showed greater gains in 1961 than in 1960; but listen to this—five Chapters that had losses in 1960 showed gains in 1961.

The above statistics appear to indicate that the welfare of a Chapter depends upon the leadership it receives. Companions, you are the leaders of give your Chapters; let me urge upon you that when you return home you will give your Chapter that leadership it deserves.

I feel that the following paragraph which I am quoting from the address of James Luther Jordan, Most Excellent Grand High Priest, which was delivered at the New Orleans Convocation is pertinent. I am taking the lib-vear for "Three Veare" word, state, where "Continent" was used, and one

"Listen to me! You are the leadership of Royal Arch Masonry in this state. If it is to be revitalized, you are the fellows that will do it. If you do younger and more dedicated men grab the falling torch and go out and do the job. Your generation and mine,—our generation—, seems likely to bear us by dedicated fathers. I am not seeking your plaudits or applause. I am the Capitular Craft in this state. I have failed to enlist the aid of a sufficient more able successors who follow will gain and hold your support to the end

GENERAL GRAND CHAPTER'S SECTIONAL CONFERENCE

On October 28th, 1961 I attended in Birmingham, Alabama the Sectional Meeting of the General Grand Chapter. In attendance were a total of forty-ida, Georgia, Louisiana, Mexico, Mississippi, North Carolina, South Carolina and Tennessee. Our own Grand Chapter was represented, in addition to myself, by Charles W. Amold, Past Grand High Priest and Henry Ashton Brosnaham Ir. Grand Captain of the Host. naham, Jr., Grand Captain of the Host.

One of the high lights of the Conference was an address entitled "An Aggressive Masonic Program Against Counter Influences" presented by our own Stephen Beach Dimond, Right Illustrious Principal Conductor of Work, Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters. One Alabama Chapter, Coosa Chapter No. 86, R. A. M. of Gadsden had copies of this address sent to all of its members. I am making it a part of this report.

GENERAL GRAND PUBLICATIONS

I request that you High Priests, when you return to your respective Chapters, discuss with the Companions the possibility of your Chapter's subscribing to the Royal Arch Mason Magazine for its entire membership. As you all know this is a very informative magazine, and will give your members a much better knowledge of the Blue Lodge and Capitular Masonry. The price, when the subscription is made by the Chapter for its entire membership, is just half of an individual subscription.

A few years ago, The General Grand Chapter published a History of Royal Arch Masonry in three volumes. If you are interested in Royal Arch Masonry, from the time of its inception, you should obtain this history.

The General Grand Chapter publishes a great many reference volumes and promotional pamphlets. I would suggest that you investigate this source of informative material. Our Grand Secretary can furnish you, at a nominal cost, the pamphlet "More Light". This pamphlet will answer many questions asked by Master Masons considering the York Rite.

RECOMMENDATIONS

No. 1 Companions, if I were limited to but one recommendation for the betterment of the York Rite, it would be for every Companion to take an active interest in his Blue Lodge. I know that we have so many York Rite meeting nights that it is hard to find time for attending our Blue Lodges. But, who will probably secure a petition from a newly raised Master Mason, for advancement in Masonry, the Masonic Brother that he has observed in the Lodge on each night that he was receiving his degrees; or the Brother that he has never seen attending Lodge? that he has never seen attending Lodge?

I would like to see the Presiding Officers of each of the Grand York Rite Bodies, permit those Chapters, Councils and Commanderies meeting at the same location, to change their By-Laws so that they would have a common meeting night, for the conduction of business, if they so desire.

Each Body would keep its identity and each Body would open and close at each Meeting. However, only one Body to open and close in full form, each Meeting Night; the other two would open and close in abbreviated form. The opening and closing in full form would rotate among the different Bodies each month. This would give each Body, where there are three, a full form opening and closing once in every three months. The conferring of the Degrees and Orders would be at Special Meetings, or by the Festival System.

Also, I would like to see the Monthly Meetings become a Family Night. Most of our Meeting places are so arranged that we could meet with our families for a supper; then they could find entertainment for themselves durFor those bodies that try to confer one degree each Meeting Night, on a small class, I would not recommend a change, if the work be conferred in

No. 2 Payment of Dues. I recommend that every Subordinate Chapter incorporate within its By-Laws, if it has not already done so, an Article similar Article XIII of the Uniform Code of By-Laws and then live by it. This sion for non-payment of dues on all Companions that are six months in arrears in their dues. I know that most Chapters have the policy of carrying a Companions, I believe that this is a mistake. istic journey. The General Grand Chapter's Ritual evidently has not proved to be very satisfactory, for in the Report of the Committee on Ritual presented at the New Orleans Triennial Convocation appears the following statement:—
"In view of the fact that the number of grand jurisdictions using the General Grand Chapter Ritual has steadily diminished to twenty..."

I recommend that the Incoming Grand Council and the Ritualistic Committee on Work, act together as a Committee, in investigating the possibilities of securing a different Ritual, whereby the candidates for the Royal Arch Degree simulate a hazardous journey.

No. 6 Aprons. I recommend that Section 35 of the Regulations of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida be amended or rewritten, giving the members of the Subordinate Chapters authority to wear their Chapter Aprons when attending Divine Worship in a body.

Also, I would recommend that this regulation define how the Apron shall be worn. Companions, it is immaterial to me whether the apron is worn under the coat, or over the coat; but I think that it should be uniform, and not depend upon whether the coat is buttoned or not.

No. 7 Elections. I recommend that Article II—Section 9 of the Constitution of the Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons of Florida be amended in such a manner, that the election of the Grand Scribe must be by ballot, and by the majority of the votes cast. The rules may not be set aside for the purpose of casting an unanimous ballot.

No. 8 Grand King. I recommend that the Grand King be allowed up to \$300.00 per term of office for expenses in attending, with the Grand High Priest, the Annual Convocations of Grand Chapters of Royal Arch Masons of other jurisdictions. I have attended the Annual Convocations in several other Grand Jurisdictions, and found them very inspiring and educational; but it was in the closing months of my term of office. If the Grand King had the opportunity to attend these Convocations, the Grand Chapter of Florida would profit by the information he received.

No. 9 Triennial Committee. I recommend the appointment of a Standing Committee to be known as the Triennial Committee. Their duties to be: Creation of interest and attendance of the Triennial Convocations of the General Grand Chapter and Sectional Conferences.

No. 10 Grand High Priest's Report. I recommend that the Report of the Grand High Priest be printed, or mimeographed prior to the Annual Grand Convocation; and copies of same be given to the representatives of the Subordinate Chapters, and Grand Chapter Officers and Members, at the time of their registration.

This should help in the understanding of the Grand High Priest's Report, reduce the time required for him to make his report, and would be very beneficial at the time the Report of the Committee on Capitular Jurisprudence is given.

No. 11 Photographs. I recommend that beginning with 1963, that the photographs of the presiding Grand High Priest and of the incoming Grand High Priest both be shown in the Proceedings of our Annual Grand Convocations

VISITATIONS

I have visited each of the Subordinate Chapters during my term of Office, at least once. These visits will long be remembered. The courtesies and cordialities were indeed heart warming. But, what was most appreciated was:—that with one or two exceptions I did not make a visit, where there were not visiting Companions, other than Grand Line Officers and District Deputy Grand High Priests. Companions that had driven many miles, just to attend the Chapter at the time of my visitation. Can any Grand High Priest ask for greater loyalty?

As a part of this report, I am listing all of my visitations, without comment, but feel compelled to mention some of the invitations that I received.

I was invited to attend the Imperial Council Session of A. A. O. N. M. S. held in Miami. Here I received the same royal treatment that is given Potentials.

I was invited and attended the Grand Convocations and Grand Assemblies of Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi and Tennessee. In each instance on these visits,

I received several invitations to other Grand Jurisdictions, but was unable to accept them.

Copy of the address delivered by Companion Stephen Beach Dimond, Right Illustrious Principal Conductor of Work, Grand Council of Royal and Select Masters of the State of Florida at the Sectional Conference of the General Grand Chapter of Royal Arch Masons in Birmingham, Alabama, on October 28, 1961:

AN AGGRESSIVE MASONIC PROGRAM AGAINST COUNTER INFLUENCES

It would seem, by the topic assigned to me, that I am here to offer an ideology or panacea for Masonic problems. But such, my Companions, is not the case; rather, I would like to visit with you and together enter a chamber of reflection, where we may pause to rest and reflect.

Counter influences could well be divided into two groups, those within those without. I would like to talk with you about those from within. We are well aware, from history, that many of the former empires were destroyed from within: it could well be that our own country is completing another of these cycles. So, too, our beloved fraternity stands on the same threshold, tottering. It is up to us to support and sustain her.

Thinking back, on the progress of Masonry, we find that there were few dynamic changes in our history. Probably the greatest of these was the change from operative to speculative; yet there has been, and must in the future be, changes. Therefore I submit "THAT THE FUTURE IMPACT OF MASONRY WILL DEPEND MORE ON ITS ABILITY TO AMEND TO CHANGES, THAN ANY OTHER FACTOR."

With Craft Masonry showing only marginal gains, and in many jurisdictions losing ground, we have arrived at a crossroad, where it behooves us to rally our forces, taking stock in our own past actions and apathy, then choosing the road that can lend only impetus to our beloved fraternity.

I will advance several thoughts along this line, in a constructive vein, hoping that while empaneled here, as right thinking men and Masons, we may exploit every avenue of righteous endeavor and ascertain that which will perpetuate our beloved fraternity. That we may take home with us something that will provoke deep thinking; something that will be searched thoughtfully, microscopically, seeking out each crevice for the meats of lore that might be hidden there.

1—Active community interest: Masonry in its early beginning, and in the not too distant past, was concerned with the home and social life of its community. How far we have strayed from this path. Masonry, in the present time, has become recalcitrant when confronted with discussion on public affairs. We have become a recluse, drawing further within our shell, so that no one will know our good intent, our beneficient deeds, our philosophy of life. We must break these shackles; by entering into the daily life of our community, as a Masonic body; in this way only can we advertise our purposes, tenets and virtues, without violating our obligations.

WE MUST GAIN REENTRY INTO THE FAMILY CIRCLE. We must think of the sons and daughters of our brothers and companions, and, if necessary, as a Masonic body, enter into the political world to insure that our public schools system is kept pure and undefiled. It is only through intellectual liberty that we can maintain civil and religious liberty. These three freedoms are the cause of our country's greatness and we must see that this heritage is passed to our youth, unimpaired. Only then can they justly merit the citizenship that we enjoy.

MASONRY IS GOOD: Therefore we must bring "further light", not only to the craft but to the world at large. We must forget our selfish selves and live by the "Light" that emanates from the Holy Book upon our altars.

2—Better Community Feeling: By sitting with our neighbors, in council, on community problems and worthy charitable projects, we cannot help but on all our community. Surely it will enhance the local moral values and bring good. Goodness draws attention and raises esteem. Therefore through better public relations, we advertise and in the advertising we cannot help but solicit.

The Masonic Digest, a California publication, says, "There are not too many old men in Masonry, but there are too few young men coming into shortage of young men petitioning for the degrees. Why this small percentage clubs fill the needs of youth, with their aggressive programs of worthy comfriendship and fellowship. Everyone wants to be on the winning team, even know that my fraternity surpasses all these transitory things, but it must gird panions, it pays to advertise.

We have touched.

We have touched upon active community interest and promoting better nmunity feeling, but what of the inner workings of our own Masonic bodies? They, too, need pointing up.

3—Solidarity of Purpose Can Only Be Achieved by Unity. A show of strength deters more evil than any other thing. We have three York Rite bodies hody or another, where they remain, exercising their forte, in one votion. How much better it would be if all these horses could be hitched into three bodies, namely the Chapter, Council and Commandery, on the same member and his family.

Nothing is more dreary or uninspiring, to the sideliner, than the recitation of previous meetings, the reading of communications, the paying of bills, the discussion of officers as to when and how to practice, and many other things that are necessary to the proper functioning of fraternal bodies. To the sideliner they are of no import. He comes for the fellowship and brotherly love, or at the coffee break, at its conclusion. Can we wonder, then, why attendance in Craft Masonry is only about 61/2% of its membership? And we are follow-

Ritualism, or ritualistically perfect teams, lend import and dignity to our Masonry. But too many of our sideliners are not interested in continually seeing the exemplification of our beautiful work. They will participate and be a part lives, or that which will fill their need of fellowship and brotherly love. That With Which They Are Conversant:

- 1 Interest in Community Life.
- 3 Membership in an Esteemed Community Organization.
- 2 Knowledge that the Public Schools Will be Kept Pure and Undefiled.

4 — Wholesome Social Intercourse, for Themselves and Families. When the sideliner is assured that he can receive these interests, then he will leave his hearthside, or easy chair, even forsaking his radio and T.V., and become part and parcel of his new devotion. With one business night, for these joint bodies, each month; one night set aside for ritual, would leave at least two nights each month for the Mason and his family to commune together with their brethren. Thusly, there is one night each week and therefore in each month a brother or companion can pick the meetings that best fill his need.

To fulfill such a program takes men that are astute and uncompromising. They can be assured of rough habit and coarse diet; they can be assured, too, that the end results will more than offset the sacrifice.

The South Australian Freemason tells us, "The world needs men who can be depended upon, who put others before themselves, and who are not afraid to stand up and be counted; those who are able to add something to the uplifting of political life, something to the brotherhood of social life, something to the practical efficiency of spiritual life. Then we shall have done mankind a service."

My Companions, the die is cast: shall we sit pensively by and reminisce of the days of yore? Shall we pat ourselves on the back because we have something too good for the world to know? No, my Companions, though the problems be weighty, we shall attack them with zeal and ardor. And proudly leave to our posterity the knowledge that we were unafraid, forthright in our decisions, forthright in our actions.—But Life marches on.

The clock of life is wound but once, And no man hath the power, To tell just when the hands will stop, At late or early hour.

Now is the only time you own; Live, love, toil with a will. Place no faith in to-morrow, for The clock may then be still.

My Companions, the future impact of Masonry will depend more on its ability to amend to changes, than on any other factor.
